The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, Clergy, Gentry, and Freeholders of the County of Sussex, met at the Assizes held at Horsham, August the 25th, 1746.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

**W**E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, humbly beg Leave to approach your Royal Throne, and with the most unfeigned Joy to congratulate your Majesty on the glorious Success of your Majesty's Arms, under the wise and brave Conduct of his Royal Highness the Duke, against the Rebels, and on the Re-establishment of the Peace and Tranquility of this Kingdom. It is with the utmost Horror and Detestation we reflect upon the wicked and desperate Attempts of those Men, who, forgetful of their Duty and Allegiance to your Majesty, and of the inestimable Blessings which these Nations enjoy under your Majesty's mild and auspicious Government, have openly joined with the declared Enemies of your Majesty's Crown, in endeavouring to subvert our happy Constitution, and to introduce a popish and abjured Pretender. Animated with these Sentiments, we were determined, in the late Time of Danger, to have sacrificed our Lives and Fortunes in Defence of your Majesty's sacred Per-

son and Government, and of the Protestant Succession in your Royal Family; upon which, we are fully persuaded, the Preservation of our most Holy Religion, our Liberties and Laws, entirely depend. And we humbly presume on this Occasion, to repeat the Assurances of our steady Perseverance in the firmest Principles of Duty and Loyalty to your Majesty; and that we shall, at all Times, exert our utmost Endeavours to oppose and defeat the pernicious Designs of all your Majesty's Enemies.

The following Address of the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen, Clergy and Freeholders of the County Palatine of Chester, has been presented to his Majesty by the Right Hon. the Earl Cholmondely: Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen, Clergy and Freeholders, assembled at the Assizes for the County Palatine of Chester, held at the Castle of Chester on the first Day of September 1746.

**W**E your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, beg Leave humbly to offer our most sincere Congratulations on the signal Victory obtained at Culloden by your Majesty's Forces, under the prudent Conduct of his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, over a Band of unnatural and desperate Rebels, who attempted no less than the Overthrow of our happy Constitution in Church and State.

We are persuaded, that the glorious Spirit shewn by this Nation in Defence of your Majesty's sacred Person and Government, will for the Future discourage all Foreign or Domestic Enemies from attempting to disturb the Peace and Tranquility of these Kingdoms.

May the Blessings we now enjoy under your Majesty's mild and just Administration be continued to our latest Posterity; and may there never

never wanting one of your Royal House to reign over us to protect and defend the Religious and Civil Rights of these Nations.

*Stockholm, September 2.* Yesterday Morning his Swedish Majesty came to Town from Ekelund, as did the Prince and Princess Royal from Droningholm.

*Copenhagen, Sept. 17, N. S.* This Morning, about Four o'Clock, the Body of the late King of Denmark, which had been embalmed soon after his Decease, was conveyed hither privately from Hirschholm, and lies now in State under a most magnificent Canopy erected in the Chapel of Christiansburg. There it is to continue till the 4th of next Month, and then to be transferred, with the usual Solemnities, to Roschild, in order to be deposited in the Royal Vault there.

*Berlin, Sept. 17, N. S.* The King of Prussia arrived here on Tuesday last, and gave Audience to the Foreign Ministers the next Morning. His Majesty seems to be intirely recovered from his late Illness. Wednesday and Thursday his Majesty was on the Parade, and saw the Soldiers perform the new Exercise, which was done with great Exactness; and Yesterday he returned to Potsdam. M. Wolffstern, the Swedish Minister at Dresden, is expected here on his Way home.

*Heerderen Camp, Sept. 18, N. S.* The 14th Instant, at Three in the Morning, we filed off from our Camp of Bombay in two Columns from the Right, that is, the Austrians, Hannoverians, Hessians, and British, according to the Order of Incampment, crossed the Maese below Maestricht upon two Bridges of Pontons, begun this Morning about One of the Clock, and finished about Seven, when the Head of the two Columns arrived there. We passed as fast as possible, but as the Cavalry were obliged to dismount and lead their Horses over, it was past Four in the Afternoon before we got quite on the Brabant Side of this River. We encamped our Right beyond Gelick, and our Left near the River Jaar, between Maestricht and the Village of Wilse. The Dutch began their March at Nine the Evening before in two Lines, and passed upon our left Flank, and at a small Distance from our Front. They began to pass the Maese just as we did, one Column through Maestricht, and the other by a Bridge of Pontons above the Town. They encamped their Right near Fort St. Pierre, and their Left towards Lichtenberg, the Jaar in their Front. Marshal Saxe expecting us to pass at Viset, came with all possible Expedition, and drew up his Troops in order of Battle upon the Eminence opposite to Viset, with an Intent to fall upon us when a Part had passed; but when he found that he mistook the Point, either through Misinformation or otherwise, he marched back with all possible Diligence to his Camp

of Betou, close to Tongres, placing his Right there, and his Left towards St. Tron. He left three Detachments upon the Jaar, viz. at Neddin, Sling, and Hautain, to watch our Motions on that Side.

The 15th, the Remainder of our Artillery and Baggage joined us.

The 16th, Prince Charles, the Marshal, Sir John Ligonier, and many more, went towards Tongres to reconnoitre the Enemy's Position.

The 17th, our Army marched in eight Columns, and encamped our Right upon a high Ground in the Front of Roetsmeer, and our Left behind Millen, the Head Quarters at Heerderen. The Dutch encamped upon an Eminence between our left Flank and the Jaar, towards Basenge. Before we were quite incamped, the Enemy drew off their Detachments from Hautain and Sling, and soon after that at Neddin, and immediately changed their Situation, placing their Right near Tongres, and their Left at Bilsen, behind the Demer. They have made Redoubts and Batteries, particularly at Tongrebergh, and between it and Tongres.

Last Night General Trips, with the Corps under his Command, had a smart Engagement with a considerable Body of the French on a Pass at Hoesfeld on the Demer, but finding himself overpowered by Numbers, he retired in good Order.

*Heerderen Camp, Sept. 21, N. S.* We are now so near the Enemy, that Yesterday they fired about 50 Cannon Shot into our Camp.

*Hague, Sept. 23, N. S.* M. Gilles having accepted the Post of Pensionary of Holland, entered upon the Functions of it this Morning. Several Letters from Liege and Maestricht agree in fixing the Surrender of the Town of Namur to the 19th Instant. It is presumed that the Garrison has betaken itself to the Cittadel. Marshal Saxe maintains his Post at Tongres, and has rendered it very strong by Retrenchments and Artillery. It is supposed the Allied Army continue likewise in their late Position, as the Dutch still lay at Nederkant on the 20th Instant.

*Hague, Sept. 26, N. S.* The Surrender of the Town of Namur is confirmed, but we have not yet learnt the particular Articles of the Capitulation. There is an Account, that the French had left 15000 Men in that Town, with a considerable Train of Artillery, in order to batter the Cittadel; and that the rest of the Army, which had been employed in the Siege, was to join that under Marshal Saxe immediately. We have received from Paris the following Heads of the Capitulation, signed by the Deputies of the Senate of Genoa, with the Austrian General.

To deliver up the Gate of St. Pierre d'Arna to the Austrians.

To make a Present of 50000 Genollins to the Army immediately.

To wait for Orders from Vienna with regard to the Contributions to be raised.

And

And to make no Changes in the Government till Orders be received from thence.

To deliver up the Fortrets of Gavi.

That all Troops in any Castles or Towns, belonging to the Genoese, shall be deemed Prisoners of War.

That all the Cannon in Genoa shall be given up to the Queen of Hungary.

That for the Future the Genoese shall not permit the Queen's Enemies to pass through the Territories of the Republick.

That four of the most considerable Persons in the Republick shall be sent as Hostages to Milan.

That the Doge and six Senators shall be at Liberty, to set out for Vienna, to ask Pardon of the Queen, and to implore her Majesty's Clemency.
