THE following Address of the Mayor, Bailiffs and Commonalty of the City of Winchester, having been transmitted by George Bridges, Esq; one of the Representatives in Parliament for the said City, to his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, one of his Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has by him been presented to his Majesty. Which Address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Bailiffs and Commonalty of your Majesty's ancient and loyal City of Winchester.

WE your Majesty's truly dutiful Subjects, filled with Zeal for your Service, and with an unfeigned Love to your sacred Person and established Government, do most heartily congratulate your Majesty for all your acquired Glories of your Reign, and more particularly for that renowned Victory obtained by your Majesty's Arms at Culloden, under the wise and prudent Conduct of his Royal Highness the Duke, which alone restored to us the greatest of all Blessings, Peace at Home, and a full Enjoyment of our civil and religious Rights, by suppressing that daring and desperate Rebellion, which had so long wrested out of our Hands those invaluable Blessings, and threatened us with Ruin and Destruction.

We are too sensible that all Addresses to your Majesty on this joyful and ever memorable Occasion, will want Eloquence and Force suitable to the Glory and Importance of it. But we do faithfully assure your Majesty, that you will receive no Address which comes more from the Heart, than this of your loyal City of Winchester.

Permit us therefore, Dread Sir; to conclude these our hearty and sincere Congratulations to your Majesty, by joining with you in most

devout Acknowledgements to the God of all Victory, for these late unspeakable Mercies bestowed on your Majesty and your Kingdoms, beseeching him to continue your Majesty's Reign over us, till it becomes as renowned for its Length, as it is already for the Glory of it.

Given under our Common Seal this Four and twentieth Day of September, in the Year of our Lord, One thousand seven hundred forty and six.

Constantinople, August 20. On the 29th past the Grand Vizir was deposed and banished to Rhodes. The Kayshaw Bey is made Vizir, and Seyd Effendy (who was Ambassador in France) succeeds to the Post of Kayshaw Bey. The Austrian Resident makes To-morrow his Publick Entry, as Inter-Nuncio from his Imperial Majesty.

Petersbourg, September 6. Yesterday being her Imperial Majesty's Name Day, the Foreign Ministers had the Honour to compliment her in the Forenoon. They were all invited to Dinner at the Great Chancellor's; and in the Evening there was a Ball at Court.

Stockholm, September 16. Yesterday at Noon a Herald at Arms, with 12 Trumpets, and a Kettle Drum, proclaimed, in the usual Manner, the Opening of the Diet; and the Members of the House of Nobles are accordingly now busy in giving in their Names and their Proxies to their Secretary. After To-Morrow it is thought they will proceed to the Election of their Marshal. The Diet however will not be in full Activity before the next Week, as the Bank Men, the 20 Electors, the Secret Committee, and other Deputations, must be chosen, before they can go upon any Business, and that will take up the Remainder of the Week.

Munich, September 29, N. S. We hear the Duke of Wirtemberg is at present with the Elector Palatine at Mannheim, who intended in a few Days to move with his Court to Dusseldorp. The Dutch Commissary is upon the Point

Point of setting out from hence for Donawert, in order to receive and march off the last Division of the Bavarian Troops, in the Pay of the Maritime Powers. The Prince of Hilburghausen, who commands them, will set out To-morrow.

Berlin, October 1. The King of Prussia is still at Potzdam, where the Anniversary of the Battle at Sohr in Bohemia, was solemnized Yesterday, in Presence of all the Generals who commanded in that Engagement. His Majesty is expected to arrive at Charlottenburg To-morrow, and to come to Town the Day after. The Chief of a Regiment of Hussars Major General Ziethen, and his Lieutenant Colonel Vippach, who commands those five Squadrons which are now in Mecklenburg, have been presented each of them with a magnificent Sabre by the King.

Hambourg, October 4, N. S. The Bells of the several Steeples in this City were rung Yesterday an Hour in the Forenoon, and another in the Afternoon, it being the Day preceding the Interment of his late Danish Majesty; and in the Cathedral was held a Funeral Oration. To Day the like Ceremony of ringing Bells has been observed, and will be again To-morrow for the third and last Day. Count Raab, who had designed giving an Entertainment upon this Anniversary of his Master the Emperor's Name-Day, has deferred it for eight Days, upon Account of the usual Funeral Ceremonies in this City, upon the Death of a King of Denmark. Prince George of Holstein, the youngest Brother to the appointed Successor in Sweden, and who has a Regiment of Dragoons in the Prussian Service, is to be married to a Princess of Holstein-Beck, and Dowager Countess of Dohna.

Heerderen Camp, Oct. 5, N. S. Prince Clermont's Aid de Camp, who was dispatched by him to Marshal Saxe on Sunday Morning, was taken by some of our Hussars with his Dispatches. We since hear that the said Prince was to be, with the Body of Troops under him that were employed in the Siege of Namur, on the 7th at Judoigne, and the 8th at St. Tron, in order to join the Marshal. Our Army passes the Jaar To-morrow or next Day. We have just heard that the Enemy abandoned Huy Yesterday Morning, to join that Corps likewise to their main Body. Our Hussars had a Skirmish on our Left with four Squadrons of the Enemy's, which they attacked in their Flank, routed them, and took 15 or 16 Prisoners, and as many Horses; but perceiving five or six more Squadrons and some Foot coming to their Relief, they retired with little or no Loss. The first Column of the Bavarians comes this Day to Aix.

Whereas certain Information has been made, upon Oath, before one of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace, that the Chester Mail, of the 2d of July last, was robbed by a Person who goes, or has gone by the several Names of GABRIEL TOMKINS, alias YOUNG GIBB, alias KIT JERVIS, alias CHRISTOPHER WOOD, alias UNKLE, alias RAWLINS, who has been formerly a Smugler, and was some Years since employed as a Riding Surveyor in the Service of the Customs, and some Years ago lived at the Town of Darisford, in the County of Kent: He is a Man of between Forty and Fifty Years of Age, of a very swarthy Complexion, somewhat marked with the Small Pox, about Five Foot Nine or Ten Inches high, is a very well made Man, walks very upright, with large dark Eye-brows, which hang over his Eyes, and has formerly received a Wound in his Left Arm with a Pistol or Musquet Bullet, of which some Mark or Appearance is left.
