*Copenhagen, October 18.*

**T**HE Asiatick-Company's Ship called the Copenhagen, from Canton, is now come into this Road, as is also one called the Dock from Tranquebar. They are still expecting one from China, and another from Tranquebar.

*Amsterdam, Oct. 25, N. S.* We have Advice from Paris of the 21st Instant, that the English Troops under General Sinclair had made a second Descent at the Point of Quiberon near Grucis, and had made themselves Masters of a Battery, which entirely covered their Camp: That the Town of Nantes was in the utmost Consternation, and that the Arriere Ban had Orders to march. By Letters from Liege of the 21st Instant, Marshal Saxe set out upon the 20th from Tongres, in his Way to Brussels and Paris, having left the Command of the French Troops,

which were said to have entirely evacuated the Territories of Liege, and to be in March for Louvain, to M. Bowerdahl. By our last Accounts from Brussels, the Rear Guard of the French Army was encamped near Louvain, from whence it was expected to remove quickly into Winter Quarters.

*Hague, October 25, N. S.* The French Army is supposed to have broke up about the 20th Instant; and some Advices received to Day mention the Austrian Irregulars having already possessed themselves of Tongeren, where the French had left an Hospital. We have Advice here, that his Britannick Majesty's Troops made a second Descent on the 15th Instant, upon the Coast of Britany, a little to the East of Port Louis. The News of the young Pretender's having gained the Coast of France, in the Neighbourhood of Morlaix, is confirmed.

Whereas certain Information has been made, upon Oath, before one of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace, that the Chester Mail, of the 2d of July last, was robbed by a Person who goes, or has gone by the several Names of GABRIEL TOMKINS, alias YOUNG GIBB, alias KIT JERVIS, alias CHRISTOPHER WOOD, alias UNKLE, alias RAWLINS, who has been formerly a Smugler, and was some Years since employed as a Riding Surveyor in the Service of the Customs, and some Years ago lived at the Town of Darisford, in the County of Kent: He is a Man of between Forty and Fifty Years of Age, of a very swartby Complexion, somewhat marked with the Small Pox, about Five Foot Nine or Ten Inches high, is a very well made Man, walks very upright, with large dark Eye-brows, which hang over his Eyes, and has formerly received a Wound in his Left Arm with a Pistol or Musquet Bullet, of which some Mark or Appearance is left.

By Intelligence received, since the first Printing of this Advertisement, the above described Gabriel Tomkins has a small Wart or Wen at the Corner of one of his Eye-brows, next to his Nose, and is said to appear in a shabby brown dusky Coat, much pieced and torn, and trimmed with white metal Buttons,

a deep blue Waistcoat, and an old light or lightish Wig turned Yellow with the Wearing.
