Stockholm, October 10:

ARON Korff is to have Tomorrow an Audience of his Swedish Majesty, in which he will deliver his Credentials as Ambassador Extraordinary from the Empress of Russia.

Berlin, October 25. Yesterday about Noon the King of Prussia arrived here from Potzdam, in very good Health. The late Privy Counsellor Ferber was executed on Saturday last at Spandau for treasonable Correspondences.

Hambourg, October 28. The Debates in the Chamber of the Nuncio's in the Diet of Poland, which continued till the 13th, being then happily ended, they united with the Senators, and with them were presented to his Polish Majesty; and having had the Honour to kiss his Hand, the Dyet became active, and was opened for the Dispatch of Business the 14th Instant.

Copenhagen, October 29. Yesterday Morning the Mediterranean Squadron, consisting of three Men of War and a Frigate; under the Command of young Count Donneskiold, returned hither in good Condition, having touched last at Cadiz. The Count, who has concluded a Peace or Truce between this Court and the Algerines, landed immediately upon his Arrival, and went to Jagersberg, where he was very graciously received by their Danish

Majesties. His Danish Majesty has declared the Duke of Wirtemberg Oels and Major General Kaas Lieutenant Generals of the Cavalry.

Camp at Tegelen near Venlo; November 1; N. S. Upon the 26th past Lieutenant General Sir John Ligonier marched from the Camp of Ambie, and arrived here upon the 30th with the British and Hessian Troops. Tomorrow we shall cross the Meuse, and march towards Grave and Boileduc. Upon the 3d the Prince of Hesse will march towards Nimeguen: General Somerfeldt marched upon Saturday the 29th.

Hague, November 1, N. S. We hear from Paris, that they had received Advice there, that the English were again embarked from the Point of Quiberon. Amongst the Troops, which are in March for Brittany from the Netherlands, are the Regiments of Clare and Berwick, Irish, and Monny and Seckdorff, Swiss. Chabriet and Durumains Regiments of Horse lead the Van. The Whole will consist of 20,000 Men; which were to march without halting. The Ban and Arriere Ban of the Province were in Motion, and the Parliament of Rennes were exerting itself to the utmost in raising Men. By the last Letters from Italy we are informed, that the French and Spaniards had all repassed the Var. Advices from Barcelona mention, that there were 3000 Men and upwards ready to embark there for Italy; and

and that new Levies were making in Valentia and Arragon.

Hague, November 4, N. S. By our last Advices from Paris, the Earl of Morton remained Prisoner in the Bastile; but it was said that his Lady and his Family were to be released upon the 31st past. The News of the great Loss of the French at the Passage of the Var, is not confirmed; but we have Accounts, that the King of Sardinia had worsted the Enemy in different Actions upon the 14th and 15th past, and the following Days, and had thereby made himself Master of the whole County of Nice, and it was expected his Majesty would march forthwith into Provence. The Enemy, since their repassing the Var, are said to point directly towards Toulon. All the Letters from Paris agree, that the Duke d'Anville has failed in his Enterprize, but the Circumstances of his ill Success are carefully concealed by the French Court. By our last Advices from Brússels, Marshal Saxe continued there, and had given Orders to the French Officers not to part with their Equipages, but to hold themselves in Readiness to march at a Moment's Warning. The French were fortifying Louvain, and a Garrison of 3000 Men was ordered to Nivelles.
