Westminster, November 21.

HIS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in his Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir William Saunderson, Deputy Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from his Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, his Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to,

An Act for the further continuing an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act to empower his Majesty to secure and detain such Persons as his Majesty shall suspect are conspiring against his Person and Government.

Naples, November 1. On the 26th, 27th, 28th, 29th, and 30th past, anchored in this Port, after a tedious Voyage, from Majorca, Antibes, Nice, and Villa Franca, eight Transport Vessels, with about 1100 Soldiers; whereof 450 out of the King's auxiliary Troops from Lombardy, and 650 Spaniards from Majorca. There remain at Antibes about 500 Foot with the Baggage, and the Cavalry, which, they say, are on the Point of Sailing for this Kingdom. Twelve Battalions out of the Spanish Troops on the Coast of Provence, are expected to arrive in this Kingdom, to protect it against any Invasion.

Leghorn, Nov. 4, N. S. Letters from Genoa of the 29th past, mention the Arrival of his Sardinian Majesty the 19th at Nice, the advanced Guard of his Army having harrassed the Enemy's Rear, and on the 20th at Night obliged them to repass the Var, abandoning the Isles of that River; the Enemy burnt and destroyed the Bridges they had on the several Branches, and were retired to St. Lawrence, Gattiere and St. Paul. Seventeen Vessels sailed from Genoa for Nice, laden with Field Cannon, Ammunition and Provisions for the Service of the Austrian Army, and were convoy'd by his Britannick Majesty's Shebeck the Postilion; and other Preparations are making at Genoa for the Subsistence of the Corps that are marching into Provence. Upwards of 100 Canoneers are arriv'd in St. Pierre d'Arana from Lombardy;

and General Botta has demanded of the Republick a Train of 40 Pieces of Battering Cannon: This had occasioned very warm Disputes in their Council, and it had been offered by them, that if he would consent, they would be at the Expence of drawing the Austrian Train from Placentia, but this was rejected by the General, who still insisted that the Republick should comply with his Request. The General is regulating the Winter Quarters for the Troops that remain in the State of Genoa, and when he has finished the Affairs depending with the Republick, he is order'd to go to Pavia. His Britannick Majesty's Ship Liverpool, was in the Mole of Genoa, and was to carry General Brown from thence to Nice.

Florence, Nov. 7. The Emperor has sent Orders to raise a Battalion of Marines, the Commission of which has been given to M. O'Kelly, Governor of Grosseto, who is to have the Command of it. They are to serve on board the Gallies when at Sea, and to guard the Coasts. The Emperor, with a View of encouraging the Trade and Commerce of Tuscany amongst his own Subjects, has given Orders to the Secretary at War to distribute Patents to any of his Subjects that are inclined to fit out trading Vessels either for the Levant or other Places. With the above Orders the Regency received Notice, that the Emperor has disposed of twelve Commanderies of the Order of St. Stephen, one of which in Favour of M. Botta, Nephew of the Austrian General of that Name.

Vienna, Nov. 16. It is supposed here that the combined Forces of her Imperial and his Sardinian Majesties will pass the Var as on the 18th Instant. Besides the Detachments from the Low Countries, this Court has Advice, that all the Troops which can possibly be spared out of Alsatia, and that Neighbourhood, are ordered into the Southern Parts of France. The Marriage of a Saxon Princess with the Dauphin was to be notified as this Day in form, by Count Lofs, to their Imperial Majesties.

Vienna, Nov. 19, N. S. The States of this Dutchy are to furnish 40000 Recruits, or the Value of them, to the Empress. The new Levies go on with great Success.

Munich, Nov. 17, N. S. On the 15th Instant the Empress Dowager received an Estafete from

from her Sister the Queen of Poland, with Advice, that a Marriage is concluded between the Dauphin and the third Princess of Saxony. The French Minister at Warsaw has killed her Highness's Hand, and the Marquis de Nivernois, Son to the Duke of Nevers, is said to be named to receive and conduct the Princess into France. Count Cobenzel is making the Tour of several Courts in Franconia; and the Court of Vienna having resolved to remove General Tor-naco from Stutgard, another Person will be sent to that Court from their Imperial Majesties. The Elector of Cologn is still expected at Mergenthal in the Course of this Month, to hold a Chapter of the Teutonick Order; and it is expected he will come hither. By Letters of the 9th Instant from Genoa, we have an Account, that Montalban and Villa Franca have capitulated, upon Condition that the Garrisons shall not serve against the Empress and King of Sardinia for 18 Months, and that every Thing was preparing with the utmost Zeal and Industry for the Invasion of Provence.

Copenhagen, Nov. 19. Count Danneskiold's Dismissal was signed Yesterday, and on Monday next he is to take Leave of the Admiralty; and the young Count Danneskiold, who came lately from the Mediterranean, has asked and obtain'd his Dismissal likewise.

Hague, Nov. 25, N. S. We learn from Paris by Letters of the 21st Instant, N. S. that the Chevalier de Bellisle was supposed to be arrived at Chalons upon the Saone, and to have proceeded to Lyons, in order to embark at those Places the Troops destin'd for Provence. It is reckoned, that at the End of this Month, M. de Bellisle will have received a Reinforcement of 20 Battalions. Some new Regiments which were in Alsace, have received Orders to march into Provence, and the Regiment of Lowendahl, which is one of those which guarded the Lines, is of the Number that is to go to the Franche Comté, and proceed from thence into Provence by the Rhone. 'Tis said that they are raising in Britany 12000 Men, who are to be formed into regular Troops, for the Protection and Security of that Province, or to serve elsewhere, in the room of those which are marching thither.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint the Right Honourable John Lord

Monson, Richard Plummer, Robert Herbert, John Pitt, Baptist Leveson Gower, and James Grenville, Esqrs; together with Thomas Hay, Esq; commonly called Lord Viscount Dupplin, and Francis Fane, Esq; in the room of Edward Ashe, Esq; who has resigned and James Brudenell, Esq; deceased, to be Commissioners for Trade and Plantations.

Admiralty Office, November 21.

Captain Rodney, Commander of his Majesty's Ship the Eagle, being on a Cruize, on the 29th of last Month, he took a French Privateer, called the Shoreham of Nants, carrying 22 Guns and 260 Men, after a Chase of 16 Hours, and has brought her with him into Crookhaven.

Whereas upon a Representation made by Rear-Admiral Byng in December last, (who was then Commander in Chief of his Majesty's Ships and Vessels employed on the Coasts of North-Britain) to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that his Majesty's Ship the Gloucester, going into Leith Road, struck upon a sunken Rock little known, that lies in the fair Way going in, which had Sixteen Feet Water upon it at low Water, the said Rear Admiral was ordered to cause a Buoy to be fixed on the said Rock; their Lordships do hereby give Notice, that a Buoy is accordingly fixed on that Rock, which is called the Gunnet Rock; that the said Buoy lies two Miles to the Westward of the Island of Inchkeith in the Firth of Forth, in the fair Way as Vessels go into Leith Road, and on the West End of the Rock in three Fathom Water at low Tide. All Vessels, going into the said Road, are to keep to the Westward of the Buoy, the Rock being about 180 Fathom long from the S. E. to the N. W. and 30-feet broad. At Spring Tides there are only Nine Feet Water on some Parts thereof.
