Vienna, November 23.

THIS Court has Letters from General Brown at Nice, who, upon his Arrival there, found the King of Sardinia ready to join two more Battalions, and the whole Infantry in a Condition to pass the Var. That General has been received with great Distinction by his Sardinian Majesty.

Berlin, Nov. 26. His Prussian Majesty came to Town on Wednesday last about Noon. On Thursday General Bernes had a private Audience of the King in his Closet, to which he was introduced without any Ceremony: After which his Majesty appeared in Publick, and then the Minister of the Duke of Wurtemberg, Baron Keller, had his Audience of Leave. The same Day, in the Afternoon, the King returned to Potsdam, and was followed by the Minister of State Baron Borcke; but M. Mardefelt, who arrived with his Majesty from Potsdam, continues here; and it is thought that his Majesty will come back hither on Tuesday or Wednesday next.

Copenhagen, Nov. 26. The King and Queen of Denmark returned hither on the 22d, and were followed by the Queen Dowager, and the Princess Louisa, on the 24th. The Royal Family is all lodged at the New Palace of Christiansbourg. M. Puschkin, Envoy Extraordinary from the Russian Empire, had Yesterday his first Audiences of the King and Queen of Denmark in the usual Manner.

Augsburgh, Nov. 28, N. S. According to our last Advices from Nice, which may be depended upon, General Brown, since his Arrival there from Genoa, had visited and reconnoitred several Posts upon the Var, which he had found well guarded and lined by the Enemy's Picquets, supported by a Brigade of Infantry and some Cavalry encamped behind them, about Half a League from that River; but that notwithstanding this Disposition, it was probable the

Austrian General would attempt to pass that River in a few Days. The same Letters add, that the Bulk of the French Army lay at Antibes, but that the Spanish and Walloon Guards were marched with Don Philip to Arles; that eight other Spanish Battalions, and eight hundred Dragoons had been embarked five or six Days before for Naples; and that forty-eight Squadrons of the same Nation were marched into Savoy.

Munich, Nov. 28, N. S. The Elector of Cologne, who is expected here, was to be at Mergenthal on the 10th of December, where he is to keep Christmas, and to be here about the Middle of January.

Rotterdam, Dec. 2, N. S. Her Royal Highness the Princess of Hesse landed here this Morning from England, and sets out To-morrow by Break of Day for Utrecht.

Amsterdam, Dec. 2, N. S. We hear from Brussels, that the French Troops which are at Hall, Tubize, Braine le Comte, and Soignies, have received Orders to hold themselves in Readiness to march at a Moment's Warning: That the Cavalry had also been ordered to supply themselves with Hay sufficient for four Days, and several Pontons with great Quantities of warlike Stores were sent towards Louvain; from which they concluded that the French were forming some Design against Maestricht.

Hague, Dec. 2, N. S. The States of Holland met last Wednesday, but have hitherto been taken up in disposing of vacant civil and military Employments. The Letters from the Netherlands bring no other News but that the French continue to assemble a Train at Namur, where they have already 50 Pieces of heavy Artillery. It is supposed in those Parts, that they have an Eye on Luxembourg, in the Neighbourhood of which Place they are said to be assembling provisionally 40 Battalions. Advices from Provence, by the Way of Paris, say, that the Austrian and Piedmontese Army had not yet passed the Var on the 18th past, N. S. On the other

hand, it is written from Munich, that they had Accounts there, of undoubted Authority, that five Battalions, supposed to be the Head of the Army, had passed that River on the 16th. And there are other Letters from Swifferland to the same Effect.

Hague, Dec. 6, N. S. The States General have, in order to strengthen the Number of Officers in the respective Regiments of their Infantry, taken a Resolution to add a second Lieutenant to each Company, with Ensign's Pay; and to make good this additional Expence, by reducing four private Men per Company. Marshal Bathian is daily expected here from Aix la Chapelle; and the Generals Cronstrom, Smisfaert, and Burmania, are arrived here from Brabant. The Marquis del Puerto, the new Spanish Ambassador, at this Residence, is expected in a few Days, having already past Hambourg.

Admiralty Office, November 28.

Captain Arbuthnot, Commander of his Majesty's Sloop the Jamaica, being on a Cruize on the 23d Instant, espied a Sail coming from under St. Alban's Point, to which he gave Chace at One o'Clock, and came up with her at Six in the Evening: She proved to be a French Cutter Privateer, called the Furet, of Boulogne, of eight Carriage and six Swivel Guns, and 43 Men, and Captain Arbuthnot has brought her with him into Spithead.

Admiralty Office, November 29.

On the 24th Instant his Majesty's Ship the Namur chased into the Squadron under the Command of Vice-Admiral Anson, the Mercury, formerly a French Ship of War of 58 Guns, but then serving as an Hospital Ship to the French Squadron lately commanded by the Duke D'Anville: She left Chiboctou in Acadia the 23d of October, with the Remains of that Squadron, consisting of six Sail of the Line, several Frigats, and between 30 and 40 Merchant Men. The Mercury being a good Sailor was got a-head of the French Squadron, and steering directly for Brest.

On the 19th Instant his Majesty's Ship the Portland took, 73 Leagues West S. W. from Ushant, a French Frigate called the Subtile, of 26 Guns, 194 Men, and has brought her into Torbay. She had been eighteen Days from Brest, and was returning thither, without having taken any Thing.

Admiralty-Office, November 14. 1746.

Whereas upon a Representation made by Rear-Admiral Byng in December last, (who was then Commander in Chief of his Majesty's Ships and Vessels employed on the Coasts of North-Britain) to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that his Majesty's Ship the Gloucester, going into Leith Road, struck upon a sunken Rock little known, that lies in the fair Way going in, which has Sixteen Feet Water upon it at low Water, the said Rear Admiral was ordered to cause a Buoy to be fixed

on the said Rock; their Lordships do hereby give Notice, that a Buoy is accordingly fixed on that Rock, which is called the Gunnet Rock; that the said Buoy lies two Miles to the Westward of the Island of Inchkeith in the Firth of Forth, in the fair Way as Vessels go into Leith Road, and on the West End of the Rock in three Fathom Water at low Tide. All Vessels, going into the said Road, are to keep to the Westward of the Buoy, the Rock being about 180 Fathom long from the S. E. to the N. W. and 30 feet broad. At Spring Tides there are only Nine Feet Water on some Parts thereof.
