these Miniflers, will have in their Negoriation, The, Multaufine as we are affored, put a Garilon into Multaufor, a free Imperial Town in the upper Alfu-tia; and it is likewife faid. That there is a Neutrality agreed on between Britew, and the Government of Briffe.

Hamburgh, Febr. 8. From Stockholm they write, that their Majeffics are, as yet, at Facebadal, two leagues from that City, but that the Twenty fifth of the Moneth paft they intended to begin their journey towards the Univerfity of Hpf11, which they had till then deferred, by reafon of the bid weather ? That the Count de Wringel, who had formerly ferved the Poles in their Wars against the Turks, was appointed by the King to go Ambaliador to War fam, to condole with the Queen, upon the death of the late King, and to be pre-fent at the Election: That the Sieur Wangelin, who arrived there with the Treaty of Defence, concluded with the Elector of Brandenburgh, was returned again with itratified. That the French Minister, with great earnefinels prefles that Crown to declare infavor or the King his Mafter, according to the Obligation, as he fays, of the late Treaty concluded between the two Crowns. Our Letters from Copenhagen, southirm the conclution of the Treaty Defensive, between the Emperor and that Crown ; and in the mean time, the Dutch Minister there is negotiating a nearer alliance between his Majefly, and the States General of the Hailed Pro-Tinces.

Cologne, Febr. 16. The fourteenth inflans, about four in she afternoon, Prince Willem of Furfic nberg, going according to his usual custom, in his Coach, attended by his Secretary, and two other Gentlemen, who were in the Coach with him, and three Footmer, to wait upon the Elector of Cologne, whole cheif Minifler he is, and Plenipe centiary at the Treaty of Peace, which is negotiated here being near to the Abbey of S. Pantalean, here in Town, where his Electoral Highness has refided fince the taking of Bon, was attacked by a party of nine men, armed all with Swords and Fire-arms, another party of like number keeping at some distance to affift them, if there had been occasion, commanded by the Marquels d'Obiqqi, Major of the Marquels de Granz's Regiment, which is at Ban. They having They having befet the Princes Coach, Iome pulled the Coachman out of the Box, and endeavored to fecure the Footmen, while others affaulted the Gentlemen that were getting out of the Coach, who, though only armed with their Swords, behaved themfelves very well in the defence of their Mafter, but being unable long to refill fo unequal a force, the Prince was by the party carried away in his own Coach, his Secretary, and the two Gentlemen, being left for dead upon the place, and one of the Footmen dangeroufly wounded. On the other fide, the Marques d'Obiqqi, who commanded in this action, was very much wounded , as likewife another of his party, and one killed. About two Muskers fhot from the Gates of the Town, attended a Troop of Horfe, and a Company of Foor, who having received the Prince under their Guard, Jent back the Coach, and estried him to Dusts, en the other fide of the River, right opposito to this place, and from thence, the next morning early, conveyed him to Bon; from whenge, it is faid, they will farther sarry him to Vienna . The Marquels de Grand, in the mean time, dilowns his knowing any thing of the matter, and fo does the Minifers shat are bere for the Emperor, the King of Stain, and the States General of the Anised Provinces. The Arques d'Obizzi having been caken up very datigerby wounded, was carnied to a Convent near the place,

where this action hapned; of which, our Magistrates had no fooner notice, but they fent a Guard to fecure the faid Marquefs, demanding of him by whole order he had committed this action in a free and neural City; to which he replied, That what he had doned was by command of the Emperor. The French Ambaffadors complain highly of this proceeding, and have taken into their possession, all the Papers of the Prince, and our Maglitrates have in the interim, fent to Bon, to pray the Marquels de Grana to fet the faid Prince at liberty.

Answerf, febr. 17. All the difcourfe here is of the great appearance of a fudden Peace between His Majefty of Great Britains and the States General, and people are extreamly pleased at it. Our Letters from Amfterd.m tell us, that the Squadron fitted out by that Admiralty in this expedition will be composed of 34 or 36 Men of War; 20 of which, to be mounted from 80 to so and 40 Gunsapliece,

Bruffels, Fcbr. 11. We look upon the Peace, as good asconcluded, between the King of Great Britain, and the States General, and rejoyce extreamly at in. From Cambraj we have advice, That Don Francisce d'A-gurto, Lieutenant General of the Cavalry, had made an incution into the French Territories to command Contributions, and was returned again, having well succeeded in his enterprise. Our Levies go on apare. The French, we hear, complain highly of what has hap-ned at Colegne to the Prince of Furflenbergh, and hardly omit threats, if fatisfaction be not made.

Hagae, Febr. 16. We expect with great impatience, the return of the Trumpetter, who went hence the fixth inftant for England : It is certainly faid, That the Sieur Odyk, the Sieur Van Beuningen, and the Sieur Van Haren, will go Ambassadors Extraordinary to His Majefty of Great Britain; and the Sieur Van Beverning will remain at Cologne. The equippage notwithstanding the great appearance there is of Peace with the Crown of England, advances a pace, and the Officers of the feveral Ships have received their neceffary Or. The Stares of Holland are parted tilt the feventh ders. of March next.

Amfierdam, Febr. 16. Our Letters from England occasion here an universal joy, for that they give us great hopes of a speedy Peace ; the Actions of the Eaff India Company are hereupon railed to 4/20. and we doubt not, but fo foon as we have certain advice of the conclusion of the Peace, that they will tife to 460. The Commiffioners imployed to raife the monys on Families, have reported to the States, the great difficulties they meet with in that affair, who to supply their present occasions, have again ordered the Two hundredth penny to be forthwith raifed. At Deventer has been fome diforders amongst the Soldiers in Garifon there, for want of pay; but the bufinefs is made up agains

Paris, Febr 21.
