THE Creditors of Rice Lloyd, late of the Six Clerks Office in Chancery-Lane, in the County of Middleſex, an Inſolvent diſcharged out of his Majesty's Priſon of the Fleet, by virtue of the Act paſſed in the Tenth Year of his preſent Majesty, for the Relief of Inſolvent Debtors, are deſired to meet on Monday the 19th Day of this Inſtant January, at Ten of the Clock in the Forenoon, at the Mitre Tavern in Fleet-ſtreet, London, in order for the Choice of an Aſſignee or Aſſignees of his Eſtate and Effects, in Purſuance of the ſaid Act.
