Villa Franca, December 29.

ON Saturday last the King of Sardinia, with his Court, set out from Nice on his Way to Turin, over the Mountains. The same Evening Mr. Villetes, his Britannick Majesty's Minister to the King of Sardinia, embarked on board of the Duke Fireship for Savona, to proceed from thence for Turin. General Brown having desired another Supply of Cannon to carry on the Siege of Antibes, Captain Weller, of his Britannick Majesty's Ship the Roebuck, hath landed twenty Guns, eighteen Pounders, with Ball and all necessary Appurtenances for that Service. A further Supply of eighteen Battering Brass Cannon is arrived from Savona, under the Convoy of his Britannick Majesty's Ship the Diamond, and it is judged the Besiegers will have their Batteries ready to play on the Castle and Fortifications before the 7th of next Month. A Quantity of Provisions and Forage arrived last Week for the Army in Provence, and was sent under Convoy to Cannes; and a farther Supply is coming from Leghorn. The Troops, which are advanced in the Country to the River d'Argens, are well supplied with Provisions and Forage, of which last the Hussars on the advanced Posts about Draguinan, Roque, Brun, and Castellane, have found several Parcels, which the French Peasants had conceal'd from their own Troops. The Feversham arrived Yesterday from Mahon, and in her Way fell in with three Spanish Vessels, having Troops on board for Naples, one of which, with 93 Officers and Soldiers, she took, and the other two being near the Land return'd to St. Tropez, from whence they sail'd the same Morning. These Troops embarked at Ceuta upwards of three Months past, and had put into St. Tropez, having been chased before by some of his Britannick Majesty's Ships employed on the Coast of Provence.

Copenhagen, Jan. 21; N. S. A Royal Placard is published here, dated the 12th Instant, N. S. giving Notice, that, whereas a Treaty of Peace was concluded on the 10th of August last with the Republick of Algiers in Africa, the Subjects of the Crown of Denmark may safely

trade in the Mediterranean, making use of his Danish Majesty's ordinary Sea-Passports for the first fifteen Months from the Date of the said Treaty; at the End of which Term farther Notice will be given how they are to govern themselves in that respect for the future.

Mantua, Jan. 21, N. S. We have certain Accounts from Milan, that our Army under Marquis Botta having attacked the revolted Genoese Peasants in three different Posts near the Bochetta, viz. General Franquini on one Side; General Andreasi on another, and General St. André in the Centre; this last had the good Fortune to put to flight 12000 of them, all armed, 900 of whom were cut to Pieces by the Slavonians and Carlstadians, four Pieces of Cannon taken, and 200 Cassines burnt: That the Bochetta was thus carried without much Loss on our Side; and that our Soldiers having got Possession of the Eminences, and opened themselves a Passage to Genoa; some Detachments were already considerably advanced towards that City, and the main Body of the Army was to follow as soon as the necessary Preparations could be made, which would not require much Time.

Aix in Provence, Jan. 22, N. S. We are marching at last towards the Enemy, and our Army is to pass the Argens To-morrow, over which three Bridges are laid. The Marquis de Maulevrier, Lieutenant General, has reassumed the Command of the Left, which Major General Chevret had, and has at the Head of his Column 30 Pieces of Cannon. The Marquis de Mirepoix, who commands the Corps de Reserve, marched along the Sea Side to dislodge the Enemy behind the Siagne; who have fortified the Village of Cragnolles, in order to cover Grasse. It is not known whether they will wait for us.

Hambourg, Jan. 24; N. S. The Sieur Louchau was this Morning chosen into the Magistracy of this City, in the Room of Mr. Brokes, who died here some Days since, much and deservedly lamented.

Vienna, January 25, N. S. Father Visetti, a famous Jesuit of Genoa, arrived a few Days ago



ago at the College of Jesuits in this Town, but upon the Court's having heard of his Arrival, he was ordered to go away in Twenty four Hours Time. Yesterday Morning, a Courier arrived from the Marquis de Botta, with the important Advice of his having retaken the Bochetta, and all the neighbouring Heights. The Genoese fled towards the Town in so much Confusion, that if the Austrians had had Artillery, they might in all Probability have obliged the Town itself to surrender. No particular Relation is yet arrived, but it is said, that at one Post where the Irregulars found the most Resistance, and lost two of their best Officers, they made a terrible Massacre of all that they found in Arms. After having forced the above Posts, some of our Troops advanced as far as Campo Morone, where they heard some firing of Cannon from Genoa, which was supposed to be intended to serve as a Signal to the Revolters to retire thither, the Villages and Houses on both Sides being entirely abandoned.

Hague, Feb. 3, N. S. We have just received a Confirmation of the important News of the Austrians having forced the Passage of the Bochetta, which it is hoped, will in a short Time enable them to put an End to the Insurrection at Genoa. Letters received To-day from Paris mention, that M. Puisieux is taken ill of the Small Pox. We likewise hear from thence, that the French have surprized Castellane, which was guarded by six Austrian Battalions, two of which escaped, the remaining four are said to be made Prisoners, with the Loss only of 12 Men on the Side of the French: Other Letters mention, four Piedmontese Battalions, instead of the six Austrian ones. And it is likewise written from thence, that Antibes continued making a gallant Defence, and that the French and Spanish Army had passed the Argens the 23d, in order to march up to Count Brown, and give him Battle, having sent all their heavy Baggage behind the Durance. M. du Theil was appointed the French King's Plenipotentiary at Breda, in the Room of M. de Puisieux.

Dublin, January 20.

This being the Birth-Day of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, the great Guns were fired at his Majesty's Park the Phoenix, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out upon Oxmantown Green. At Noon the Lords Justices met at the Castle, and received the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction upon this Occasion; and at Night there was a Play given by their Excellencies for the Entertainment of the Ladies.
