Naples, January 10, N. S.

ON the 4th Instant the Canons Giordano and Ruggiero, departed from this City for Rome, in Consequence of the Notification they had received from the Court to leave this Kingdom, as Ministers of the Tribunal of the Inquisition establish'd by the Cardinal Archbishop, repugnant to the King's Jurisdiction. The same Day arrived here from Marseilles the Marquis Tripuzzi, Major General of the King of Spain's Forces, who it is said is to command the ten Battalions of Spanish Troops, Part of which are already arrived from the Coasts of Spain and Provence in this Kingdom. On the 5th, 6th, and 9th Instant anchored in this Port from Marseilles and the Coast of Provence, nine Transport Vessels, four of which had on board 200 mounted Dragoons out of the Regiments of Horse Tarragona and Rouffillon, and the other five about 1000 Men out of the Spanish Regiments of Foot, Soria and la Reine.

Rome, Jan. 14, N. S. On the 9th Instant, the new Venetian Ambassadour had his first private Audience of the Pope, to which he was introduced by the Secretary of State. On the 10th Cardinal Alexander Albani had a long private Audience of the Pope, to communicate to him the Commissions he had received from the Court of Vienna. Fresh Disagreements have lately arisen between this Court and that of Naples, on the Prohibition which the latter has caused to be notified to the Archbishops and Bishops of the two Sicilies, to suppress their Tribunals of Inquisition, and not to chastise, for the future, any Persons, either Ecclesiastical or Secular, without the Knowledge and Approbation of the Government.

On the 21st Instant, His Majesty's Sloop the *Granado*, commanded by Captain Evans, took

a French Privateer off of Scarborough, called *La Marianne* of Calais, of Ten Carriage and Six Swivel Guns, and Eighty Men, after an Engagement of an Hour; in which the Privateer had Eight Men killed, and Fifteen wounded. The *Granado* did not lose a Man, but received great Damage in her Sails and Rigging; and has brought her Prize into the Humber, which had three Ransomers on board, when taken.

On the 25th Instant, his Majesty's Ship the *Grand Turk*, commanded by Captain Kerly, cruizing between the Lizard and Scilly, fell in with the *Tavignon*, a Privateer of St. Maloes, of 24 Guns, and 120 Men, and began to engage her about One o'Clock; the Privateer, after two or three Broadfides, was for making off, but her Rigging and Sails being much shatter'd, and finding she could not get away, she struck about Four, and is brought into Plymouth. The Privateer had one Man kill'd, and several wounded; and the *Grand Turk* had not a Man hurt.

Whereas Vincent Matthews, alias John Saffary, alias William Morris, Esq; alias Thompson, is charged with the Robbery of his Majesty's West Mail upon the 8th of February 1743. He is described to be a lean Man, about five Foot seven Inches high, with a thin long Visage, of a fresh Complexion, somewhat freckled about the Temples, and somewhat pitted with the Small-Pox, and with a longish Nose, with a Rising in the Middle of it. He is farther described to be somewhat round-shoulder'd, with a slender hollow Back, with thin Legs and thick Ankle Bones, and is said to be of a mean Capacity, and writes a very bad Hand, and spells very ill; he is about Thirty-five Years of Age, and is said to have a small white Hand, to be slow of Speech, and of an effeminate Voice, and to stammer a little when he speaks. He was formerly a Hackney-Coachman, belonging to the White Hart Yard, and afterwards kept the White Hart Inn in Brook's Market, which he quitted about four Years ago; after that he lived in Theobald's-Row, and pretended to be a Dealer in Meal, but, as is said, rode in a Gang of Smuglers, and since that he some Time lived at Bedford; and lastly he lived as a Person of Figure and Fortune in and near the City of York, and particularly at two Houses, or Places called Acomb and Middlethorp, where he went by the Name and Title of William Morris, Esq.

This is therefore to give Notice, That whatever Person or Persons shall, now, or at any Time hereafter, apprehend the said Vincent Matthews, alias John Saffary, alias William Morris, Esq; alias Thompson, so that he be brought to Justice, will be intitled to a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds on the Conviction of the said Vincent Matthews for the said Offence, over and above what is allowed by Act of Parliament for the apprehending of Highwaymen. The same Reward and Encouragement is offered to any Person or Persons who may have been an Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Robbery, who will moreover be intitled to his Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
