Vienna, February 11, N. S.

A BODY of about 800 Carlstadters, making one Column of 4000 which are going to the Netherlands, were reviewed this Day by the Court, and are to march To-morrow with the utmost Diligence to Wertheim, where they will be embarked upon the Mein; another Division will be here in a few Days, while two others are gone through Styria and the Tyrol. They are cloathed in red Uniforms, after the Manner of their Country, are marshalled and disciplined in as regular a Manner as any other Troops, and gave an entire Satisfaction to all who saw them.

Copenhagen, February 18. A Royal Ordinance is just come from the Press, containing a Plan for raising 100,000 Reichsthalers, or 20,000 Pounds Sterling, by Annuity for Lives, in the Way of Tontine, so that the longest Liver in each Class is to enjoy the Income of the Whole. The Directors of the Asiatick Company received Yesterday an Advice, which gives them Reason to believe, that one of their two last India Ships, supposed to be lost, had put into a Port of the Isle of Madagascar to refit.

Copenhagen, Feb. 21, N. S. The Queen of Denmark being several Months gone with Child, publick Prayers were put up for her Danish Majesty in all the Churches here last Sunday on that Account. This Incident retards the Ceremony of the Coronation; which, as it cannot be performed till her Majesty has lain in, and is thoroughly recovered again, may probably be deferred till about the latter End of August, or the Beginning of September next. Three Frigates, besides those usually employ'd as Guard-Ships, are fitting out with all Expedition.

Hague, Feb. 24, N. S. We learn by the last Letters from Lombardy, that on the 4th the Austrians took Possession of Pietra Lazerata towards the Bochetta, and of the Post of Rossiglione towards Novi, and that they had not made any further Motion, besides that of conducting from Campo Fredo six Pieces of Cannon, designed for the Attack of the Castle of Mazone, which the Genoese were Masters of; and that they were waiting for a Reinforcement of Troops which were coming from Lombardy with a

Train of Artillery; and that the Genoese had begun to intrench themselves at Genoa and St. Pierre d'Arena. There was besides a Body of Troops upon the March from the County of Nice to reinforce the Austrians. The Inhabitants of the Valleys of Ponsevera and Bisagno had offered to submit themselves to the Austrians, on Condition that they should not be deem'd to have been engaged in the Rebellion of Genoa, as they were forced to take up Arms. 'Tis added, that the Genoese were resolved to stand a Siege, and not to surrender, as long as the Austrians continued to insist upon their submitting themselves to the Mercy of the Empress Queen of Hungary. There is a Report, that 4000 of the French Troops, and 2000 Spaniards, were to embark at Antibes, in order to go to the Relief of Genoa. We have Advices from Provence, that Don Philip and the Duke of Modena were gone to pass their Winter at Chambery; that the Spanish Troops are in March in order to quarter in Savoy and Languedoc; and that Marshal Belleisle had Orders to quarter his Troops in the Neighbourhood of the Var, so as that they might be re-assembled in a short Time. They write from Paris, that Marshal Saxe would set out very soon for Bruffels; and that all the Officers belonging to the French Regiments in Flanders, had Orders to repair to their respective Corps before the 20th of next Month, N. S. All the Household Troops were to be reviewed upon the first of April, and then to set out for Flanders.

Hague, Feb. 27, N. S. The Letters from Paris mention, that Marshal Belleisle had established his Head Quarter at Brignoles, as being the Center of Provence. Two Battalions were posted at Vence, and Cagne, twelve or fifteen at St. Laurent, and the Places adjacent on the Var, and 50 more in other Parts of Provence; but the greatest Part of them were placed upon the Argens. Some Battalions were to go into Dauphine, and the Cavalry to be posted upon the Rhone.

Whereas Samuel Verry, late of Horsington Hill, in the Parish of Perivale in the County of Middlesex, Farmer, was, on Saturday the 24th of January last, between Seven and Eight of the Clock in the Evening, attacked
