Munich, March 2:

BY Letters from General Brown we have Advice, that he had detached all his Cavalry into Lombardy, and ten Battalions of Foot towards Genoa; and that the King of Sardinia had agreed to furnish a considerable Number of Cannon and Mortars to be employed against that Town.

Munich, March 9. Letters from Provence tell us, that the French Generals praise the Order of General Brown's Retreat. That Don Philip, the Duke of Modena, and the Marquis de Las Minas, will pass the rest of the Winter at Montpeiller. That 18 Swiss Battalions, who are so reduced as not to amount to 3000 Men, four other Battalions called the Little Wallons, with two Irish, all of them in a very weak Condition, are ordered into Savoy, and the greatest Part of the Spanish Cavalry into Languedoc. These Letters add, that the French have sent a considerable Number of Officers and Engineers to Genoa, with 1,500,000 Livres, intended for the Support of 4000 Foot, which they design, if possible, to throw into that Town, where the Genoese pretend to have at present 4000 regular Troops, composed of Corsicans and Austrian Deserters. On the other Hand, the last Letters from Italy say, that upon the Separation of the French and Spanish Troops, General Brown has resolved to march all his Infantry towards Genoa, except ten Battalions, who are to guard different Posts near the Var, the Austrian Horse being already march'd to Lombardy. That Count Schulemberg had not

yet received the Artillery he expected for the Attack of Genoa, but that a Body of Austrians had fallen upon the Genoese Peasants near Campo Morone, and killed a great Number of them, without Distinction of Age or Sex, their Officers not having been able to restrain the Fury and Resentment of the Soldiery.

Copenhagen, March 4. The annual Ceremony of opening the High Court of Justice having been performed on the 2d Instant, the King of Denmark, as usual, sat personally in Judgment upon the Causes which were brought that Day before the Court.

Hague, March 14, N. S. We learn from the Ports of France, that the Martinico Fleet has been dispersed by a Storm; fifty Sail of Merchant-men were wanting when the last Letters came away; the Convoy and four India-men were arrived. This Fleet came away from Martinico the 8th of January, without waiting for the St. Domingo Fleet; from whence they had Advice, that the Fleet bound from Europe to Cape François had been chased by some English Men of War, and that it was feared that fifteen Sail of Merchant-men, which had not been heard of, were taken. They write from Paris, that the Corps now assembling near Sedan, is to consist of 25000 Men, to be commanded by Count de Clermont, Prince of the Blood: This Corps, it is said, is to be employed in a Siege, whilst M. de Saxe, under the French King, commands the Army of Observation. The Grand Prior of France has ordered eight Gallies to Antibes, from thence to escort some Succours that the Court of France is sending

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ing to Genoa. M. de Saxe was to leave Paris this Day or To-morrow. Advices from Brussels say, that all the Militia raised in the new-conquered Towns of the Low-Countries is sent into Provence. In the last Week, eighteen Battalions of Militia passed through Brussels in their Way to Mechlin, Antwerp, and Louvain; the two Battalions left at Brussels are employed to mend the Roads towards Philippeville. Quarters are marked out at Namur for 25000 Men that are expected there soon, and the Magistrates of Brussels have Orders to provide Quarters for a considerable Body of Horse and Foot expected to be there this Week. As the Dyke of Linchoten did not give Way, and the Gap in the Dyke near Wyck is stopped up, and the Water is, by the South-East Winds, considerably fallen, we are in no Fear of any farther Progress of the Inundation, which threaten'd most Parts of the Districts of Rhymland, and the Neighbourhood of Amsterdam. The Damage done by this Inundation is not so considerable as was imagined at first.

Hague, March 17, N. S. The States have resolv'd to recall M. Van Hoey from Paris. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland has begun to put the Army in Motion, by giving Orders to the Dutch Troops that are in the Province of Frizeland and Groninguen, to draw nearer to the main Body of the Army. By Letters from Paris of the 13th Instant we learn, that the Embarkation of the Succours designed for Genoa was to have begun on the 2d, and that it was reported that they had sailed with a favourable Wind. Affairs at Genoa continued pretty much as they were, but the Austrians seem'd to be making Dispositions for a considerable Effort. The Islands of St. Marguerite, which were said to have been taken, had not been attacked in Form. M. de Chevreton met with Obstructions which occasioned the postponing the Attack thereof to another Time. Two English Men of War which cruiz'd before those Islands, prevented the Barks from landing the Troops.

Whereas Samuel Verry, late of Horsingdon Hill, in the Parish of Perivale in the County of Middlesex, Farmer, was, on Saturday the 24th of January last, between Seven and Eight of the Clock in the Evening,

SERMONS on various Subjects,
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Salop, February 24, 1746-7.

WHEREAS John Edmonston, a Travelling Scotchman, was attacked this Morning about Six o'Clock, in the Road between the Cross Houses and this Town, near the Sign of the Fox, by two Men, who robbed him of Fifty One Guineas, one Moiadore, a Silver Watch with a chas'd Case, Maker's Name Engley; and his Pocket Book, in which was a Foot Licence: Whoever will give Notice of either of the Persons concerned, so that he may be brought to Justice, shall receive the Sum of ten Guineas, (besides what the Law allows) of William Buchanan in Salop. N. B. One of the Men was tall, and had on a brown short Wig, and a dark colour'd Coat; the other was short, with his own Hair Black and Strait, and dark colour'd Cloaths.
