HEREAS in pursuance of the Powers vested in his Majesty, by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act to enable his Majesty to make Rules, Orders, and Regulations, more effectually to prevent the spreading of the Distemper which now rages amongst the Horned Cattle in this Kingdom, which is explained and continued by an Act passed in this present Session of Parliament; his Majesty hath thought proper, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, from Time to Time, to make such Rules, Orders and Regulations, as to his Majesty in his great Wisdom appeared to be most likely to prevent the spreading of the said Distemper. And whereas it was, amongst other Things, required and commanded by his Majesty, by his Order in Council of the Seventeenth Day of December last, That no Oxen, Bulls, Cows, Calves, Steers, or Heifers (except fat Cows and Oxen ready for immediate Slaughter) should be sent, driven, or removed, or caused to be sent, driven, or removed, out of any Town, Parish, or Extraparochial Place, to any Fair, Market, or any other Town, Parish, or Extraparochial Place whatsoever, within that Part of Great Britain called England, or should be bought, sold, or offered or exposed to Sale, in any such Fair, Market, Town, Parish, or Extraparochial Place, for the Space of three

T the Court at St. James's, the Twelfth | Calendar Months, to be computed and begin from the Twenty-seventh Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and forty six; and that no fatted Oxen or Cows, should be driven, removed, or fent, or caused to be driven, removed, or fent, to or from any fuch Fair, Market, Town, Parish, or Extraparochial Place, unless under such Restrictions and Regulations, as were fet forth in the said Order of the Seventeenth Day of December; And whereas his Majesty, by his Order in Council of the Fifteenth Day of January last, was pleased to take off the faid Prohibition, so far as the same related to fatted Calves ready for Slaughter, under such Limitations and Restrictions as were to be used with respect to fatted Cows and Oxen. And whereas it hath been represented to his Majesty, that it will be expedient, after the Twenty fourth Day of this Instant March, to permit lean Oxen, Bulls, Cows, Calves, Steers, and Heifers, to be driven, removed, bought and fold, that his Majesty's Subjects may be enabled to stock their Grounds, and make their Lands useful, provided the same be done under such Restrictions as may be necessary at the same Time, to prevent the spreading of the said Distemper—— His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, hereby require and command, That all Rules, Orders, and Regulations heretofore made, in relation to fatted Cows, Oxen, and Calves, be strictly observed for the Space of three Calendar Months from the Twenty fourth Day of this Instant March, and that the same be extended to fatted Steers and Heilers ready for immediate Slaughter: And his Majesty doth hereby permit lean Cattle to be driven, removed, fold, and exposed to Sale, provided nevertheless, and his Majesty doth hereby strictly require and command, that for the Space of three Calendar Months, to be computed and begin from the faid Twenty fourth Day of this Instant March, no

Person do send, drive, or remove, or cause to 1 be sent, driven, or removed, any lean Ox, Bull, Cow, Calf, Steer, or Heifer, out of any Town, Parish, or Extraparochial Place whatsoever, within that Part of Great Britain called England, to any Fair, Market, or any other Town, Parish, or Extraparochial Place within the same, or do buy, sell, or expose or offer to Sale, in any such Fair, Market, Town, Parish, or Extraparochial Place, any lean Ox, Bull, Cow, Calf, Steer, or Heiser, unless the Person or Persons felling such Beast or Beasts, do deliver to the Person or Persons who shall buy such Beast or Beasts, a Certificate under the Hand and Seal, or Hands and Seals, of one or more Justice or Justices of the Peace, for the County, Riding, Division, City, Liberty, or Town Corporate, or of one or more Commissioner or Commissioners of the Land Tax appointed for the Year One thousand feven hundred and forty fix, who have duly qualified themselves to put the said Act in Execution, (which Commissioners are, by the Act made this present Session of Parliament, for continuing, explaining and amending the Act made the last Session, relating to the Distemper'd Cattle, empowered and required, to put in Execution all and every the Powers and Authorities given by the said first mentioned Act, or this present Act, to the Justices of the Peace of the several Counties, Ridings, Divisions, Cities, Liberties, and Towns Corporate within their respective Divisions, in as full and ample Manner, as the Justices of the Peace might do-within the lame, except within the County of Mid-. dlesex, and all Cities and Towns which are Counties within themselves) or in Case no Justice of the Peace, or Commissioner of the Land-Tax, authorized as aforefaid, be resident within three Miles of the Place from whence such Beast or Beasts shall be driven, then under the Hand and Seal of the Rector, Vicar, or Curate of the Parish from whence such Beast or Beasts shall be driven, or in his Absence, of the Rector, Vicar, or Curate of some neighbouring Parish, specifying the Name or Names, and Place or Places of Abode of the Person or Persons, selling such Beast or Beasts, and that upon Examination on Oath of one or more credible Person or Perfons, it appeared to him or them, that the said Beast or Beasts, and the Herd or Herds out of which the same was or were taken, was or were and had been for the Space of Months before the Date of two Calendar such Certificate, entirely free from the said Distemper or Infection, and that such Beast or Beasts had been in the actual Possession of the Person or Persons selling the same, for the Space of two Calendar Months at the least, before the Sale thereof, except only with regard to such Calves as may be fold at or about Twelve Days old: As to which, Liberty is hereby given for the Sale of such Calves, provided, that before the

Sale thereof, such Certificate, as is before required, shall be obtained for the Cow or Cows from which such Calf or Calves came; as likewise, that such Calf or Calves are in good Health, and have not till such Time of Sale, been separated from the Cow or Cows to which they belong; —but nothing herein contained is meant or intended to take away the Liberty granted by his Majesty's Order of Council of the Fisteenth of January last, to remove Cattle from one Pasture to another, though the same should be in different Parishes, provided the Condition-required by the said Order be duly complied with.

And his Majesty doth hereby surther require and command the Church-wardens, Overteers of the Poor, Constables and Inspectors, or some or one of them, to stop any Cattle which shall be carried or driven contrary to this or any former Order of his Majesty in Council then subfisting, or to the said Acts of Parliament, and bring the Offender or Offenders before fome Justice or Justices of the Peace, or some Commissioner or Commissioners of the Land Tax as aforesaid, to be dealt with according to Law.— And such Church-wardens and other Officers. or some or one of them, are hereby authorized, during the Time that such Offender or Offenders shall be under Examination of such Justice or Justices, or Commissioner or Commissioners of the Land Tax as aforesaid, to put the said Cattle under the Care of some proper Person;— And if upon Examination before the said Justice or Justices, or Commissioner or Commissioners of the Land Tax as aforesaid, it shall appear that the faid Cattle have been driven contrary to this or such former Order, or the said Acts, then he or they do cause the said Cathe to be drove back the same Way, to the Place or Grounds from whence they were brought, with some proper Person to attend them, or take such Order concerning the said Cattle, as such Justice or Justices, or Commissioner or Commissioners of the Land Tax as aforesaid shall judge most proper, according to the Circumstances of the Case; and the Expences of the Persons so to be appointed to take care of such Cattle, are to be paid out of the County Stock, as directed by the Act of this present Session of Parliament; buti in Case it shall appear that such Beast or Beasts is or are infected, that then he or they do cause the same to be shot, or otherwise killed and buried in the Manner prescribed by his Majesty's Order of Council of the Twelsth, of March, One thousand seven hundred and forty five.

And whereas some Doubts have arisen, whether by his Majesty's afore-mentioned Order of Council of the Seventeenth of December last, a Prohibition was not laid upon the driving of Oxen from one Parish to another, in all Cases where they are made use of for the Plough and

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wher Kinds of Draft; — For obviating thereof, his Majesty doth hereby Order, with the Advice of his Privy Council, that in all those Parts of this Kingdom where it has been usual to employ Oxen for the Plough and other Kinds of Draft, no Restraint be in such Cases laid upon the Oxen, but that the Owner or Owners thereof be at Liberty to drive them from one Parish to another in the Plough, or in any Carts, Waggons, or other Carriages, or Kinds of Draft, provided no Distemper hath hitherto been, or shall hereaster happen to be amongst the Horned Cattle within Twenty Miles of the Parish or Place from which, or to which, such Oxen shall be drove.

That in all Cases where any Hide or Skin hath been, or shall hereaster be brought, sent, or caused to be brought, sent, or bought, sold, exposed or offered to Sale, contrary to his Majesty's Order of Council of the Seventeenth of December last, the Justices of the Peace, or the Commissioners of the Land Tax as aforesaid, are to cause such Hide or Skin to be cut, slashed and buried, in the same Manner as is required by the former Orders of Council to be done, with respect to the Hides or Skins of the Cattle that shall be killed, and to convict and punish the Offenders according to Law.

That no Ox, Bull, Cow, Calf, Steer or Heifer, whether fat or lean, or any Hide or Skin of such Beasts, be suffered to pass the Rivers Humber and Trent, or either of them Northward, nor the Rivers Severn and Dee, or either of them Westward, for the Space of three Calendar Months from the Twenty-fourth Day of this Instant March;—And for that Purpose, his Majesty's Justices of the Peace, as also the Commissioners of the Land Tax as aforesaid, for the several Counties, Hundreds, Ridings and Divisions through which the said Rivers run, are hereby required to cause strict Watch to be constantly kept, to guard all the Bridges, Fords, Boats and Ferries upon the said Rivers, and to carry all Offenders herein before the next Justice of the Peace, or Commissioner of the Land Tax as aforesaid, to be dealt with -according to Law.

And his Majesty doth hereby ratify and confirm all the Rules, Orders and Regulations, and also all and every other Part of his afore-mentioned Orders in his Privy Council of the Twelsth of March, the Seventeenth of December, and Fisteenth of January last, unless where the same are varied by this present Order.—And his Majesty doth hereby strictly charge and command all his Justices of the Peace, Commissioners of the Land Tax as aforesaid, Constables, Churchwardens and Overseers, and all Farmers, Cowkeepers, and others, to conform themselves to what is thereby required, as also by this his surther Order in his Privy Council

* Turin, March 4, N.S. By our Advices the French General is preparing to recover the Islands of St. Margaret, and has already erected two Bomb Batteries on the Neck of Land that faces the Fort; but they have hitherto had no great Effect. The French, we hear, have likewise endeavoured to land a Body of Troops upon those Islands; but they have been repulfed by the Garrison, which is reinforced. Our Advices from Toulon and Marseilles, as well as Vice Admiral Medley's, confirm, that the French are preparing a confiderable Number of Embarcations, for fending a Body of Troops to Genoa, with Officers and Engineers. Six Battalions are designed for that Service, and it is said they are to be followed by fix more. The British Ships are stationed in the most proper Places for intercepting them, both on the Coast of France, and in the Neighbourhood of Genoa. Count Schulemburg continues his Preparations with all the Activity and Diligence which the Season of the Year, the Nature of the Country, and the Scarcity of Cattle for Draught, will admit of, and it is hoped it will not be many Days before he will have commenced his Operations. The Regiments from Provence are in full March for reinforcing his Army, and some of them have already reach'd Savona. General Brown is not yet

yet arrived here, but he was set out from Nice on the rst Instant; he is expected To-morrow

or next Day.

Baron Borcke, the second Minister of State for foreign Affairs, died here of an Indigestion, after an Illness of sour or five Days; and it is thought he will be succeeded in his Place by Baron Mardefeldt, formerly Minister at Petersbourg.

Hague, March 21, N.S. They write from Paris, that the Troops designed for the Succour of Genoa were supposed to have sail'd the 8th; and that besides those at first appointed, the Regiments of Salis, Viguier, Royal Barriere, and Royal Italian, had been ordered thither, under the Command of M. de Mauriac Major General, and were to be convoyed by three Men of War, and some smaller Vessels: That the Austrian Forces which remained upon the Var, had raised Redoubts to defend the Passage of that River against the French; and that the Ist Instant, in the Night, they had set Fire to that Part of their principal Bridge, which they had before left standing, which the French endeavoured to prevent, and killed several of the Party employed upon that Service. And they add, the Austrians were refortifying Montalban. Marshal Saxe's Departure was deferred, and Marshal Belleisle expected at Paris the 22d. The French King's Equipages were preparing with great Diligence. Several Regiments of Cavalry, which were supposed to be designed for the Netherlands, had Orders to march for Prověnce.
