Turin, March 4, N.S. By our Advices the French General is preparing to recover the Islands of St. Margaret, and has already erected two Bomb Batteries on the Neck of Land that faces the Fort; but they have hitherto had no great Effect. The French, we hear, have likewise endeavoured to land a Body of Troops upon those Islands; but they have been repulfed by the Garrison, which is reinforced. Our Advices from Toulon and Marfeilles, as well as Vice Admiral Medley's, confirm, that the French are preparing a confiderable Number of Embarcations, for fending a Body of Troops to Genoa, with Officers and Engineers. Six Battalions are defigned for that Service, and it is faid they are to be followed by fix more. The British Ships are stationed in the most proper Places for intercepting them, both on the Coast of France, and in the Neighbourhood of Genoa. Count Schulemburg continues his Preparations with all the Activity and Diligence which the Seafon of the Year, the Nature of the Country, and the Scarcity of Cattle for Draught, will admit of, and it is hoped it will not be many Days before he will have commenced his Operations. The Regiments from Provence are in full March for reinforcing his Army, and fome of them have already reach'd Savona. General Brown is not yer
