N Officer fent by Admiral Medley to Baron de Launay, Commandant of the Fort of Villa Franca, has brought the News, that Yesterday the English took, off of Monaco, fifteen Veffels with French Troops on board, bound from Loalon to Genoa. Two others had excaped into the Harbour of Monaco; and it was supposed that the rest, who were entirely dispersed, would endeavour to get back to fome Port in France. An English Captain, arrived in this Town fince, from on board the Squadron, gives the fame Account, as an Eye Witness; and adds, that by the Positions of the Squadron, they should give a good Account of the reft. By this Officer's Report; the whole Convoy amounted to between thirty and forty Veffels of all Sizes.

Venice, March 24, N.S. On the 18th Inflant Feldt Marshal Schulemburg's Body was inter'd with great Military Pomp, under one of the Baffions of Verona; and the Senate, in Acknowledgment of his Services to the State, particularly his memorable Defence of Corfu, have decreed him a magnificent Monument to be credied in the Arfenal 'at the publick Experce. Count George Schuleinburg, the Marthal's Heir, is daily expected from Vienna. We have no News from the Austrian Army. The Letters from Genoa are of the 11th, but contain nothing remarkable, except M. Lomellini and M. Doria being dispatched to Antibes, to folicit and haften the Succours they expect. from France. Turin, March 26, N.S. By Letters received from Savona and Villa Franca, there is an Account, that the French Embarkation from Marseilles and Toulon, having on board 6000 Men, defigned to reinforce and affift the Genoele, put to Sea for the fecond Time on the 16th or 17th Inflant; that the Transports in their Paffage fell in, about the 20th, with fome English Ships cruizing in those Parts; that at least

foners already made, and that the reft of the Convoy were closely purfued by the faid Men of War.

Hogae, April A, N.S. We learn from Aix, that Marshal Belleulle set out the 22d past for Verfailles, having left the Command in Provence to the Chevalief his Brother: The Marquis de la Mina was set out front Montpellier to meet the Marshal upon the Road. One of the Men of War that failed from Marseilles, as Convoy' to the Troops intended for Genoa, on the 17th Inflant having sprung a Mast, the same Day anchored with the Transports in Toulon Road; but soon after the Commanding Officer at Toulon sent Orders to the Transports to fail under-Convoy of the Fingat the Flora. The Man of War was to follow as soon as she had got a new Mast.

Hogue, April 4, N. S. By Yefterday's Letters from Bruffels, Marshal Saxe arrived there the Day before, and daily expected Count Lowendahl thither, to concert with him about their Operations. The French heavy Artillery was getting ready with all Speed; and they were erecting thirty Ovens at Louvain.

Rotterdom, April 7, N. S. His Koyal Highnefs the Duke arrived here about Seven this Evening, and failed for Boulleduc; and as the Wind is very favourable, we may suppose he will land To-morrow Morning, The Transports and the Yacht from the River Thames are arrived at Helvoet. Tilbourg April 11, N:-S. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland is arrived here from the Hagne. Hague, April 11, N. S. Some Advices mention, that General Schulemburg is march'd, and having found that the Genoele had fooiled the common Roads, he had made a new one over the Hills ; and, by the Affiffance of his Lycanians, had achually got his Cannon upon the Hills which command Genoa.

Hogue, April 11, N.S. By Letters from Paris of the 7th, we have the following Particulars of the Embarkation from the French Ports in the Mediterranean for Genoa. Eleven Tranfports were taken by the English Men of War, and fent up to Villa Franca, the 21st and 22d of last Month, 14 more were run into the Harbour of Monaco, two of which were closely purfued by an English Man of War; three Ships with Spanish Troops were got into Agay, and two at Antibes, waiting there for M. de Las Minas's farther Orders. M. Taubin, having with him ten Transports with Spanish Troops, was still missing. Advices from Bruffels fay, that the Troops quartered about Ath and Alost are to march in a few Days; and that those that are in the Neighbourhood of Courtray are immediately to follow them. The French are putting great Quantities of all the Necessaries for a Siege in Boats upon the Canal at Bruffels: A Train of heavy Artillery, that arrived from Bruffels the 8th Inftant, is likewife to be embarked. Count Lowendahl is not to return to Namur, as was faid; he is to continue with the Marshal de Saxe. M. de Belleisse is arrived at Versailles, and it is faid that he is soon to return to the Army. Count de Clermont is gone to take upon him-the Command of the Corps faid to be affembled near Sedan. The latest Letters from Milan arrived .at Paris, and the News from the Mediterranean, increased their Fears for Genoa.
