Nice, March 21.

AN Officer sent by Admiral Medley to Baron de Launay, Commandant of the Fort of Villa Franca, has brought the News, that Yesterday the English took, off of Monaco, fifteen Vessels with French Troops on board, bound from Toulon to Genoa. Two others had escaped into the Harbour of Monaco; and it was supposed that the rest, who were entirely dispersed, would endeavour to get back to some Port in France. An English Captain, arrived in this Town since, from on board the Squadron, gives the same Account, as an Eye Witness; and adds, that by the Positions of the Squadron, they should give a good Account of the rest. By this Officer's Report, the whole Convoy amounted to between thirty and forty Vessels of all Sizes.

Venice, March 24, N. S. On the 18th Instant Feldt Marshal Schulemburg's Body was inter'd with great Military Pomp, under one of the Bastions of Verona; and the Senate, in Acknowledgment of his Services to the State, particularly his memorable Defence of Corfu, have decreed him a magnificent Monument to be erected in the Arsenal at the publick Expence. Count George Schulemburg, the Marshal's Heir, is daily expected from Vienna. We have no News from the Austrian Army. The Letters from Genoa are of the 11th, but contain nothing remarkable, except M. Lomellini and M. Doria being dispatched to Antibes, to solicit and hasten the Succours they expect from France.

Turin, March 26, N. S. By Letters received from Savona and Villa Franca, there is an Account, that the French Embarkation from Marseilles and Toulon, having on board 6000 Men, designed to reinforce and assist the Genoese, put to Sea for the second Time on the 16th or 17th Instant; that the Transports in their Passage fell in, about the 20th, with some English Ships cruising in those Parts; that at least

14 or 15 have been taken, about 900 Prisoners already made, and that the rest of the Convoy were closely pursued by the said Men of War.

Hague, April 4, N. S. We learn from Aix, that Marshal Belleisle set out the 22d past for Versailles, having left the Command in Provence to the Chevalier his Brother; The Marquis de la Mina was set out from Montpellier to meet the Marshal upon the Road. One of the Men of War that sailed from Marseilles, as Convoy to the Troops intended for Genoa, on the 17th Instant having sprung a Mast, the same Day anchored with the Transports in Toulon Road; but soon after the Commanding Officer at Toulon sent Orders to the Transports to sail under Convoy of the Frigate the Flora. The Man of War was to follow as soon as she had got a new Mast.

Hague, April 4, N. S. By Yesterday's Letters from Brussels, Marshal Saxe arrived there the Day before, and daily expected Count Lowendahl thither, to concert with him about their Operations. The French heavy Artillery was getting ready with all Speed; and they were erecting thirty Ovens at Louvain.

Rotterdam, April 7, N. S. His Royal Highness the Duke arrived here about Seven this Evening, and sailed for Broulleduc; and as the Wind is very favourable, we may suppose he will land To-morrow Morning. The Transports and the Yacht from the River Thames are arrived at Helvoet.

Tilburg April 11, N. S. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland is arrived here from the Hague.

Hague, April 11, N. S. Some Advices mention, that General Schulemburg is march'd, and having found that the Genoese had spoiled the common Roads, he had made a new one over the Hills; and, by the Assistance of his Lycanians, had actually got his Cannon upon the Hills which command Genoa.
