WHEREAS by Order of his Majesty in Council of the Twelfth of March last, Liberty was given to fend, drive, or remove, or cause to be sent, driven, or removed, any lean Ox, Bull, Cow, Calf, Steer or Heifer, out of any Town, Parish, or Extraparochial Place whatsoever, within that Part of Great Britain called England, to any Fair, Market, or any other Town, Parifh, or Extraparochial Place within the fame; or to buy, fell, or expose, or offer to Sale in any fuch Fair, Market, Town, Parish, or Extraparochial Place, any such lean Bealt*or Bealts as are aforementioned, for and during the Space of three Calendar Months, to be computed and begin from the Twenty-fourth Day of the faid Month of March laft; which Liberty was granted upon this express Condition, That the Person or Persons selling such Beast or Beasts, should deliver to the Person or Persons who should buy such Beast or Beasts, such proper Certificate or Certificates as are required by the faid Order: — And whereas his Majefty hath received Information, that though the Distemper amongst the Horned Cattle is entirely ceased in the County of Middlesex, and is greatly decreased in feveral other Parts of the Kingdom, yet that it still continues to rage in fome other Counties, and hath lately foread itfelf into feveral Parts of the Counties of Derby and Nottingham on the North Side of the River Trent, infomuch that there is Reason to apprehend, that the permitting any Horned Cattle to be bought and fold in Fairs and Markets, to be beld either in fuch Places where the Diftemper may happen to be, or in any Places in the Neighbourhood thereof, may be attended with bad Confequences, and be a Means of Ipreading the faid Diftemper still further : For the better preventing whereof, his Majesty doth, by this his Order in his Privy Council, hereby authorize and empower any four Persons, being Juffices of the Peace, or Commissioners of the Land Tax (authorized by Virtue of an Act of this prefent Selfion of Parliament, to put the faid Act and his Majesty's Orders of Council in Execution) within their respective Divisions, to put a Stop to the holding of any Fairs or Markets, for the buying and felling of fuch Horned Cattle, where they shall apprehend the holding thereof, may be attended with the Danger of spreading the faid Distemper, for and until the Twenty-fourth Day of June next.

Fairs or Markets, and to flue their Orders to the chief Conftable, or Headborough of the Hundred, Lath, Rape, or Wapentake, and to the Petty Conftables of the respective Parishes within the fame, to prevent the holding fuch Fair or Market. And if any Perfon or Perfons shall prefume to drive, remove, or fend; or caule to be driven, temoved, or fent, any fuch Beast or Beasts, to fuch Fair or Market, contrary to the Orders issued by the faid Justices or Commissioners in that Behalf, such Person or Persons fo offending, shall be carried before fome neighbouring Justice, or Commissioner as aforesaid; to be dealt with according to Law.

And whereas his Majefty was pleased by his Order in Council of the Twelfth of March last, (for obviating any Doubts that might arife about driving Oxen in the Plough, Cart, &c.) to allow of and permit Oxen to be drove in the Plough, Cart, Waggon, and other Carriages, from one Parifh to another, upon Condition that no Diftemper had been, or should afterwards happen to be amongst the Horned Cattle within Twenty Miles of the Parish or Place from which, or to which fuch Oxen fhould be fo driven. And whereas it hath been this Day represented to his Majesty, that notwithstanding the faid Permiffion, it hath fo happened in feveral Parts of the Kingdom, that many Farmers and others have not received the Benefit thereby intended, in regard the faid Diftemper hath in fome Counties spread itself within Twenty Miles of every Town and Village thereof; his Majesty taking the same into Consideration, and being defirous to remove any Impediments upon Husbandry, so far as may be done with Safety, is pleafed, by this his Order in his Privy Council, to permit and allow, that from henceforward, Ox Teams in any Kind of Carriages may be driven from one Parish, or Place, to another, provided such Teams be not driven hearer than three Miles to any Place where the Diftemper is, or shall happen to be amongst the Horned Cattle; and provided also, that before such Oxen shall be permitted to be for driven. a Certificate be obtained under the Hand and Seal, or Hands and Seals of one or more Juftice or Justices of the Peace for the County, Riding, Division, City, Liberty, or Town Corporate, or of one or more Commissioner or Commissioners of the Land Tax as aforselaids or in Cale no fuch Justice of the Peace or Commillionet

millioner of the Land Tax, authorized as aforefaid, be refident within three Miles of the Place from whence such Ox Team shall be driven, then under the Hand and Seal of the Rector, Vicar, or Curate of the Parish from whence fuch Team shall be driven, or in his Absence, of the Rector, Vicar, or Curate of some Neighbouring Parifh, specifying the Name or Names, and Place or Places of Abode of the Person or Perfons to whom the faid Ox Team doth belong; and that upon Examination on Oath of one or more credible Person or Persons, it appeared to him or them, that the faid Oxen, and the Herd or Herds out of which the fame was or were taken, had been, for the Space of two Calendar Months before the Date of fuch -Certificate, entirely free from the faid Diftemper or Infection. And whereas by Order of his Majesty in Council of the Twelfth of March last, it was directed amongst other Things, that no Hides or Skins should be fuffered to pais over the Severn Westward, or any of the other Rivers therein named, for the Space of three Calendar Months, to commence from the Twenty, fourth Day of the faid Month of March: And whereas it has been represented to his Majefty in Behalf of the Tanners of the Parish of St. John's near the City of Worcester, and within the Liberties thereof, though separated therefrom by a Bridge over the River Severn, that the faid Tanners are engaged in an annual Contract with the Butchers of the faid City of Worcester, to take the Hides and Skins of the Beafts and Calves which shall be flaughtered within the faid City; but that they are reftrained from carrying the fame from thence into the faid Parish of St. John's by Reafon of the faid Parish being situated on the Westward Side of the faid River, and therefore humbly praying, in regard to the particular Circumstances of their Case, and to the enabling them to fulfil their Contract with the faid Butchers, that they may be allowed to carry the Hides and Skins of Beafts and Calves flaughtered in the faid City of Worcester cross the Bridge to their Tann Pits at St. John's; His Majesty taking the fame into Confideration, and having received Information that not only the City, but the whole County of Worcester hath been free from the faid Diftemper, is hereby pleafed, in regard thereto, and to the particular Circumstances attending the Cafe of the Tanners at St. John's, to order, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, that Liberty be granted to the Tanners living at St, John's aforefaid, to carry over the Severn Westward the Hides and Skins of Beasts and Calves flaughter'd in the faid City of Worcester, notwithstanding any Thing contained in the aforementioned Order of Council of the Twelfth of March last to the contrary; provided the faid Tanners do first obtain such Certificates, as to the Health of the Beafts and Calves from which fuch Hides and Skins shall be taken, as are required by his Majefty's Order of Council of the Seventeenth of December last to be obtained upon the felling Hides or Skins.-And for the better notifying of this Order, it is his Majesty's Pleasure, that the fame be forthwith printed and published, and be also inferted in the London Gazette, and be likewise read, together with the faid former Orders of Council, in all Parish Churches, Chapels, and other Places fet apart for Divine Worship, on such Sunday in every Calendar Month, as the Minister of fuch Parish shall think

proper, according to what is required by the Act paffed this prefent Sellion of Parliament. Temple Stanyan.

Constantinople, March 18, O.S. On the 3d, Instant the British Ambassador had a most gracious Audience of the Grand Seignior, attended with all the usual Honours, and received the additional one of the Sable Fur. The Chiaiah Zeyd Effendi, who attended his Father as Ambaffador to the Court of France, and was fince fent thither himfelf on that Embaffy, was depofed, and return'd to his old Post of Telfter Emini, or Archive-keeper of the Treasury. The Chiaus Baschi, or Grand Master of the Ceremonies, was made Chiaiah, or Affistant to the Vizier, in his Room. The Ambassador sent from the Grand Seignior to the Great Mogul, died on the Road thither. The Captain Bafcha is preparing to put to Sea with eight Shiptand Gallies, to receive the Dues, as usual, from all the Islands of the Archipelago. The Pascha of Cyprus is transferr'd to that of Heydin in Afia - the Palcha of Belgrade to that of Bender. On the 12th at Night died Ofman Parcha of Caramania, known by the Name of Bonneval: It is assured he received above twelve Months ago, Absolution of Mahometanism from the Superior of the Jesuits, though he continued to live in the Mahometan Faith : He died of the Gout in his Stomach, and almost insensible from his first Attack: His adopted Son Solyman Aga, his Valet de Chambre, born in the Milanefe, succeeds him as Chief of the Bombardiers. * One Grillo, a Venetian, having infested these Seas under Maltele Colours, after having taken many Turkish Prizes and enriched himself, abandoned his Shipy and hired a French one at a great Price to carry him and his Effects on the Coaft of Dalmatia; this Ship put into Dulcigno, where the Turkish Ambassador secur'd Grillo, and hung him on the Yard-arm, seized the Effects, the French Captain and his Crew, and made the latter all Slaves. Penryn, April 20. Yesterday was brought into this Harbour by the Amazon and Speedwell, the Mary Magdalen Privateer of St. Malo, taken by Admiral Anfon's Fleet the 9th Instant off Scilly, after upwards of four Months Cruize, in which she had taken 15 Vessels, many of them from Oporto, and had her Ransomers on board. This is the Ship which took the Hornet and Hinchinbrook Sloops of War, and the King William Store-ship. She mounts 26 Guns, 22 Nine Pounders, on one Deck, and has 304 Men on board. Last Night about 80 Men, Part of the Crew of the Lark Privateer of Bayonne, which was taken the 14th Inftant of Ushant, were delivered to the Commissive here, but the Privateer is not as yet brought in. Berlin, April 25. The Dutch Minister at this Court, General Ginckel, died last Night. Hague, May 2, N. S. Yesterday we had Information that the Towns of Dort, Haerlem, Delft, Schiedam and Leyden, had conformed to the Resolution of Rotterdam with respect to the Stadtholder; and this Evening we have Advice that Amsterdam likewise had followed their Example. The Regents of the Province of Utrecht have also taken the same Step; and To-morrow is fixed for his Highness's Nomie nation for that Province. By the News from Dutch Flanders, the French have made no farther

ther Progress fince the taking of Sluys. Sas van Ghent has hitherto defended itself very well. Fort Phillippine continues still to make a gallant Defence; and General la Roque, who is at Hulft, has been join'd by the three English Battalions under the Command of General Fuller, who is now incamped at Axel. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland's Quarters are now at West Mael, and the Right Wing of the Army extends itfelf to Breschaten, within a very fmall Diftance of Antwerp. Some Letters from Paris mention, that by their last Advices from Italy, the Austrians were faid to have attack'd and taken feveral Pofts which lay in their Way to Genoa; and that it was reported that the French Troops had abandon'd St. Pierre d'Arena, the Austrians and Piemontese having begun the Operations of the Siege. They add, that that Capital was invested on the 7th or 8th, and that the Genoele had fuffered extremely in a Sally which they made from the Town. A Confirmation of this News is impatiently expected. Hague, May 3, N. S. This Morning about Eleven o'Clock, his most Serene Highness the Prince of Orange was proclaimed Stadtholder, Captain General, and Admiral General of the Province of Holland, and a Deputation of the States was order'd to repair to his Highness, to acquaint him therewith. We hear from Rotterdam, that the Society of the great Filhery have petitioned the Magistrates for Leave to put the Coast of Holland in a State of Defence at their own Cost, by raising Batteries at the Point of Goerée, and the opposite Shore near the Briel, and on the Point of Holland. General la Roque having been joined by the English Battalions from Zealand, gives great Hopes that he will be able to make an effectual Stand at Hulft. By Letters from Italy we are informed, that the English Men of Wat in those Seas, had fallen in with fome more Transport Ships from the Coaft of France, bound with Troops for Genoa, and had taken the whole Spanish Regiment call'd the Royal African, with 200 Men detached from other Regiments. Flushing, May 4, N.S. ^ It is reported, that Sas Van Ghent was taken on Sunday Night, though as yet no Person is arrived here from that Place. At Seven this Evening two Boats arrived here from Hulft. The Paffengers, bring an Account, that the French having laft Night made an Attempt to cut off the Communication between the Garrison and Welforden, where the Troops under Major General Fuller landed Yesterday Morning, a very bloody Action enfued, wherein the French were repulsed, and are - faid to have loft upwards of 1000 Men. The English came up Time enough to have a Share in the Action, and are at prefent encamped at a Place called Stoppeldyck. We also, hear, that General La-Roque has found Means to cut a Dyke, whereby a great Number of the Enemy's Cannon are laid under Water; that a large Body of the Befiegers had been obliged to retire, and it was thought the Befieged were in a Condition to oblige the French to abandon the Place. We are affured, that a great Number of the French Troops; which were about Sluys and Yffendyke, and in the Ifle of Cadlant, are filing off towards Ghent.
