THE Letters from Paris of the 22d, bring no Certainty of the Day of the French King's setting out for the Army. The last Advices from Provence were of the 14th; every Thing was prepared, and all Vessels assembled at Cannes for the Attack of the Islands, but they were kept in Awe by some English Men of War. The French and Austrians from the Croisette and Cannes were bombarding each other. The last Advices they had at Paris from Genoa were of the 4th: The Austrians were advancing still nearer to the City, and M. de Boufflers exhorting the People to a vigorous Defence. The Army under M. de Saxe is not yet encamped; the Corps under Count Clermont was the 23d still near Namur, their Head Quarters at Sombreff. Most Part of the Garrison of Antwerp is encamped in the Out-works. The Prince Stadtholder was to be To-day at Zircksee, and next Monday at Tergoes, from whence his Highness is to go to Tolen; there is no Certainty what Route he will take after visiting the Towns of Zealand, where he gains the Affections of the People by his Affability, and the Pains he takes to put the Country in a proper Posture of Defence.
