Constantinople, April 25.

THE Treaties subsisting between this Empire and that of Russia, have been just renewed.

Turin, May 20, N. S. The General Officers named by the King of Sardinia to command his Body of Troops, have been at the Head thereof for several Days past: The Contingent of Artillery is upon the Road to Savona, and by this Time, it is thought, embarking there; and the Piedmontese Battalions are not only advanced on the Genoese Territories, but the greater Part of them even within Sight of the Town itself, and either at Sestri di Ponente, or in the adjacent Posts, which it has been judged necessary to take Possession of. It has been resolved to endeavour to force the Genoese out of the several Posts they still hold in the Outlets of the Town, for which a general Attack, on all Sides at the same Time, has been resolved for some Day next Week.

Turin, May 24, N. S. We have Advices from Nice, that the Bomb Battery which the French had erected on the Point of Land that faces the Fort and Habitations in the Islands of St. Marguerite, and from which they have fired between twelve and fifteen hundred Shells, has done so much Damage, and so effectually ruined both, that the Garrison has been obliged to quit them and to encamp. We have Accounts of the 21st from Sestri di Ponente, that upon the 20th at Night, General Andréasi had attacked the important Post of the Capucins near Boschetto, which the Genoese still held on that Side, and from whence they might have clogged and disturbed the March of our Artillery from Novi to Sestri; that after a pretty brisk Fire during three Hours, and some Loss on both Sides, the Imperialists had render'd themselves Masters of the Post, the Consequence of which was such, that the Genoese had endeavoured to recover it, by marching immediately to attack it with a very considerable Force, in four Columns, but that General Schuemburg, who happen'd to be there, having desired Count la Roque to send some of his Troops to reinforce the Post, the Companies of Grenadiers of the Regiment of Guards and of Piemont had been sent thither in all Haste, by the Means of which the Post had been maintain'd, notwithstanding the Efforts of the Enemy to drive us from it during seven Hours. The Loss of the Enemy was not known when the

Estafette came away, and Count la Roque only writes Word, that on our Side the Company of Grenadiers of the Guards had lost two Serjeants and some Men, and that of Piemont their Lieutenant. Colonel Franquini being advanced on the 15th Instant with a Detachment to dislodge the Enemy from an Intrenchment they had at the Bridge of Cornelian on the Polcevera near St. Pierre d'Arena, was killed by a Shot from the Enemy's Batteries, which cut him in two. Though the Enemy continued firing the whole Day, this unfortunate Gentleman was the only Person hurt of all the Detachment: He is regretted as a very brave Man, and an excellent Officer in his Way. The Preparations for the Siege of Genoa go on very briskly; and it is written, that our Batteries may be erected and begin to fire the first Week in June.

Vienna, May 27, N. S. Letters of the 17th from the Quarters near Genoa, bring little more than an Account of the Death of Colonel Franquini by a Cannon Ball, as he was reconnoitring the Town on the Side of St. Pierre d'Arena.

Vienna, May 31, N. S. An Officer arrived here on the 28th Instant, N. S. from the Austrian Army before Genoa, with Advice of the Ways having been opened and secured from St. Francesco to St. Pierre d'Arena, by dislodging the Enemy from the several Heights lying between the Poncevera and the Western Side of the Town; so that the Retrenchments and Artillery of the Genoese, which were so turned as to render the Passage along the Poncevera impracticable, are now turned towards the Town itself. The Recovery of these Posts was thought by the Enemy to be of so much Importance, that they returned early in the Morning with their main Force of regular Troops, but were repulsed with the Loss of 600 Men, and of a French Colonel. The Piemontese Troops had a considerable Share in the Success above-mentioned.

Copenhagen, May 30. To-morrow or next Day the Danish Court is expected in Town, upon Account of the Queen's Lying-in, which, it is thought, will happen about the Beginning of July.

Copenhagen, June 3. This Day died, after a short Illness, to the inexpressible Grief of their Majesties, the young Prince Christian, Prince Royal of Denmark.

Hague, June 5, N. S. Yesterday arrived here Solomon Dayrolle, Esq; his Britannick Majesty's Resident to their High Mightinesses the States General of the United Provinces; and this Morning he was introduced by the Earl of Sandwich to the President of the Week, to whom he deliver'd his Credentials.

Hague, June 5, N. S. We learn from Brussels, that the French King arrived in that Town on Wednesday Night; that his Quarters were marked out at the Abby of the Park near Louvain, but on Sunday Night he had not left Brussels. M. de Lowendahl was gone to Antwerp, and M. de Saxe to Mechlin, from whence he comes every Day to Brussels to make his Report. By Letters from Paris of the 2d Instant they had Advice, that Marshal de Belleisle was arrived at his Quarters at Cannes the 22d of May; that Dispositions were making to assemble the Army; and that the Chevalier de Belleisle was to have the Command of a separate Corps. It was reported at Paris, upon the Arrival of a Messenger from Provence, that the French had taken St. Honorat, and were besieging St. Marguerite. They had no News from Genoa; but the Letters from Turin of the 18th, and those from Genoa of the 21st, represent that City as in the greatest Distress imaginable.

Head Quarters at Bouwel, June 6, N. S.

The Enemy have been in Motion for some Days past, and have a great Part of their Force already encamped from Mechlin along the Dyle; five or six Brigades of Infantry are encamped to sustain the Works at Ponte de Walem, and as yet they keep 15 or 16 Battalions in the Town of Antwerp. The French King has not as yet left Brussels, and when he does, it is thought he will not take his Quarters at Mechlin, as too much exposed, but will be either at Louvain, or the Castle of Grimberghen. Marshal Saxe goes every Day to Brussels to make his Report to the King of what passes.

The Corps under the Command of the Comte de Clermont, which has been for some Time past about Namur, and was imagined to be destined for the Siege of Maestricht, has, upon the Arrival of the French King, made a Motion to their Left, and encamped the 4th Instant at Louvain, so that he fronts at present towards the Demar; but he will not long, it is said, keep that Position, but will move nearer the Right of their main Army.

Major General Feuerstein joined the Allied Army last Night, with a large Train of Austrian Artillery, and 2000 Recruits for the Imperial Troops.

The whole Army was under Arms the 4th at Night, on Occasion of the Victory gained over the French Fleet by Admiral Anson. The Artillery gave three Salvoes, which were followed by a Running Fire of the whole Infantry and Cavalry.

Hague, June 8, N. S. Our Letters from Brussels say, that the French King's Departure from thence was not yet fixed. M. de Clermont had joined Marshal de Saxe's Army, as had also a Corps from Flanders. By Letters

from Paris, of the 5th Instant, we have account of a Sally made from Genoa by the Count of Boufflers, at the Head of 8000 Men, the Success of which is differently talk'd of; but upon the Whole it seems, that after having been themselves at first repulsed, the Austrians had drove back the Garrison into the Town. This is confirmed by the short and undistinct Account that the Paris Gazette, and private Letters from Genoa itself, give of this Affair. Marshal de Belleisle was assembling his Army, and would, it was said, attempt the Passing the Var about the 6th Instant. The Islands of Honorat and St. Marguerite have surrendered, and the Garrisons are Prisoners of War. Several People are taken up here upon Suspicion, and a strict Search is making after those that had secret Correspondences to the Disadvantage of the State. Lord Sandwich set out this Evening for Flushing, where his Lordship intends to embark for England on board one of his Britannick Majesty's Ships. M. Van Hoey arrived here this Morning from Paris.
