Dresden, June 17, N. S. On the 13th in the Evening, the Princess Maria Josepha, third Daughter to his Polish Majesty, was married by the Bishop of Cracovie, to the Elector of Bavaria, represented by his Ambassador Baron Wetzel. After the Ceremony was over they went to Supper, the new-married Princess, the Queen, and all the Royal Family, together with the French and Bavarian Ambassadors, the Bishop of Cracovie, and the Dutchess Dowager of Courland, taking Place at the King's Table; and at another Table, in the next Apartment, supped the Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction.

Turin, June 18, N.S. By a Courier just arrived from Count de la Roque, we have an Account, That in the Night between the 13th and 14th Instant, Count Schulemberg, after having settled every Thing necessary for the Attack of the Suburb of Bisagno, which it was generally thought would not be secured without much Slaughter, had marched thither with a Body of 15000 Men. The Enemy had raised 15 Redoubts to cover that important Post, but as they were all but one filled with Genoese Militiá, there was but that one in which was a Body of Spanish and French Swis, under the Command of Marquis Taubin, a Major, General, that made any Resistance. The others were all abandoned without firing a Shot, as the Imperialists advanced to attack them. In forcing that which the regular Troops defended, and in which the greatest Part of the Enemy's Detachment was killed or taken, Count Schulemberg had but 14 Men killed, and between 30 and 40 Officers wounded. Marquis Taubin was carried off by some of his People forely wounded. We have fix of the Enemy's Officers, three of them Captains, Prisoners. By this Success the Imperialists now extend their Troops to the Eastward of Genoa, from the Mountains to the Sea Shore, and not only streighten the Town considerably themselves, by cutting off the Communication with the Riviera di Levante, and all the Supplies the Genoese draw by Land from thence, and the States of Lucca and Tuscany, but also enable our Ships to do as much by Sea. By Letters from Baron Leutrum there is an Account, that the Castle of Villa Franca has surrendered, the Garrison being Prisoners of War, and that the French were advancing towards Ventimiglia.

Copenhagen, June 20. An Augmentation of the Troops in Norway is designed to be made, which will add about Nine thousand one hundred and twenty Men to the Army of that Kingdom, in which a Body of about Six hundred Men will be restored, who are provided with an uncommon Sort of Fire-Arms, and, by Means of long Skates of Wood, go exceeding swiftly upon the Snow when it is frozen.
