Rotterdam, July 28, N. S.

OUR last Letters from Bergen-op-Zoom are of Yesterday Morning, by which we see that the Garrison behaves very well; the Batteries of the Town are well served, and do great Execution, and M. de Lowendahl does not advance much in his Approaches. It is not known what Number of Men the Besieging Army has lost; but by the Report of the Deserters, which daily come in great Numbers from thence, it must be very great. The Attack of the Lines by Part of Count Lowendahl's Army is talked of very confusedly, but this is certain, that he has not succeeded. The Corps under Prince Waldeck was still Yesterday Morning at Duinendahl, a Place about six Miles from Boisleduc, and it was thought would march soon. The French ~~army~~ have marked out a Camp nearer to Tongres, where it is thought the French King will have his Quarters; but no Dispositions are yet made to take Possession of this new Camp. They had no Advices at Antwerp Yesterday Morning of Lillo's being taken. A great Number of Wounded were arrived at Antwerp from M. de Lowendahl's Army.

Kensington, July 20.

Whereas William Bibbie, one of the Persons concerned in the Robbery of the Chester Mail on the 22d Day of April last, and who escaped out of Newgate on Friday the 10th Instant, was killed this Morning by a Fall, in attempting to get over some Paling into a Stone-cutters Yard in Church-lane, near Whitechapel Church:

This is to give Notice that whoever shall apprehend Thomas Bibbie, (the other Person concerned in the said Robbery, and who escaped with the said William Bibbie and others) and shall bring the said Thomas Bibbie back to his Majesty's said Goal of Newgate, or any

other of his Majesty's Goals or Places of safe Custody, so that he be brought to Justice for the said Offence, such Person or Persons will be intitled to a Reward of One Hundred Pounds.

N. B. The said Thomas Bibbie is about Twenty five Years of Age, about five Foot eight Inches high, a thinish Man, of a fair Complexion, a sharp Nose, wide Nostrils, full Eyes, and out-mouthed, large Cheek-Bones, and thin faced downwards.

Stamp-Office, Lincoln's Inn, July 16, 1747.

The Commissioners for Managing his Majesty's Stamp-Duties have thought fit to give this publick Notice, that by an Act passed the last Sessions of Parliament, intituled, (among other Things) An Act to give further Time for Payment of Duties omitted to be paid for the Indentures or Contracts of Clerks and Apprentices, and for better securing the Payment of the said Duties,

It is enacted, That if any Master or Mistress, who at any Time heretofore shall have neglected to pay the same, shall on or before the 29th of September next, pay the double Rates and Duties directed to be forfeited and paid by a former Act of the Eighteenth of his present Majesty, and tender to be stampt the Indentures or Contracts omitted to be stampt at the same Time, or before the 25th of December next, that in such Case the said Indentures or Contracts shall be good and available in Law, and the Clerk and Apprentice shall be capable of exercising their respective Trades and Employments as fully as if they had been paid within the Times limited by the former Acts, and are acquitted from all Penalties by them incurred.

And it is hereby further enacted, that after the 24th of June 1747, that if any Master or Mistress, by reason of their Neglect, shall become liable to pay the said double Rates and Duties, and tender the Indentures or Contracts to be stampd within two Years after the Determination of the Apprenticeship or Service, and before any Prosecution shall have been commenced for the Recovery of the Penalties or Forfeitures inflicted by the former Acts, such Indentures shall be good and available in Law, and the Clerks, Apprentices, or Servants, shall be capable of exercising their respective Employments as fully as if the said Duties so omitted had been paid within the Time limited by the former Acts; and all Persons, who have incurred any Penalties by their Omissions, are upon Payment of such double Duties, discharged from the said Penalties and Forfeitures.

And that if any Master or Mistress shall, by reason of any such Neglect, become liable to pay such double Duties, and any such Clerk, Apprentice, or Servant shall, after such Forfeiture incurred, either in the Presence of one or more Witnesses, or by Writing under his Hand signed in the Presence of one or more Witnesses, require his Master or Mistress to pay the same, and they shall not within three Months pay the same, and such Clerk, &c. shall, within two Years after the Determination of his Service, pay the said double Duties, then that it shall be lawful for the Clerk, &c. within three Months after Payment of the said double Duties by him, to demand of his Master or Mistress, their Executors or Administrators, double the Sum of Money paid or contracted to be paid, in respect of such Servitude; and in Case the same shall not be paid within three Months, that such Clerk, &c. may recover the same with Cost of Suit against such Master or Mistress, or their Executors or Administrators; and every such Clerk, &c. paying such double Duties, shall immediately, after Payment thereof, and upon signifying in Writing under his Hand, that he desired to be discharged from his Service, shall be accordingly discharged from the same, and from all Actions, Penalties, and Damages, for not serving the Time for which he was bound, and that he shall avail himself, and have the same Benefit of the Time he shall have continued with such Master or Mistress, or as he might have done in Case

Case of any Turning over to any new Master or Mistress.

It is provided, that in Case where any Prosecution shall be commenced against any Master or Mistress, for recovering the Penalties inflicted by the former Acts, and the Clerk, &c. shall pay the said double Duties, within two Years after the Expiration of his Servitude, he shall upon Payment thereof be qualified to follow his Employment, and his Indentures shall be good and available in Law.
