Night one broke the main Gallery in two Places.

Flushing, Aug. 25, N.S. We have just heard from Bergen-op-Zoom, that last Night they blew up the Tambour in the Lunette of Zealand; the Reafon given for doing which was the Danger of relieving the Posts. The Meffenger who brought the above Advice left Bergen-op-Zoom this Morning, and fays, that the Firing last Night on both Sides was more terrible than it had ever been, but that the Enemy had gained no Ground; that he left two Streets, viz. The Wouw-Straat and the Hoog-Straat, burning. The Report we received Yefterday, that Orders were given to throw the Water into the Capital Ditch, holds only fo far, that every Thing is in Readiness for it, but it will only be done in the laft Extremity, that is, when the Befieged are obliged to abandon all the Out-works.
