Bareith, August 13, N. S.

THIS Morning her Royal Highness the Margravine, lately returned from Carlsbadt, set out with a small Retinue for the Court of Berlin.

Nuremberg, Aug. 17, N. S. Baron Widman, and Mr. Burish, the Imperial and British Ministers, accredited to the Circle of Franconia, returned hither on the 14th from Bareith, and are preparing to proceed in a few Days to the Court of Anspach.

Copenhagen, August 19. On the 16th the Queen of Denmark went to the Chapel Royal for the first Time since her Lying-in, and appeared afterwards in the Circle. It is expected that some considerable Promotions will be made before the Coronation; and it is said, that five or six blue Ribbons will be then bestowed among the Ministers of the Council and the Generals. We had Yesterday a very melancholly Account from a Place called Ringsted, eight Danish Miles from hence on the Road to Holstein, where, two Days before, a terrible Fire broke out, and burnt with such Violence, the Wind blowing hard at the same Time, that in a few Hours almost the whole Town was laid in Ashes. The Church and the Convent, together with about 20 poor Houses, are all the Buildings that have escaped the Flames. The Asiatick Company has resolved to send out this Year two Ships to Tranquabar, and two to Canton.

Florence, August 15, N. S. His Britannick Majesty's Ships of War continue to intercept a great Number of small Vessels loaden with Provisions for Genoa. Two Gallies of that Republick are detained at Leghorn, not daring to venture out. They were on their Departure, but received Orders by two Expresses from Genoa, not to leave Leghorn till further Notice.

Turin, Aug. 20, N. S. Letters from Vado Bay of the 5th Instant bring an Account, that Henry Medley, Esq; Vice-Admiral of the Blue Squadron of his Britannick Majesty's Fleet, died that Morning of a Fever, after nine or ten Days Illness, much regretted.

Bergen-op-Zoom, Aug. 29, N. S. A Sally was made Yesterday about One o'Clock, by which we destroyed some small Part of the Enemies Approaches, and killed them about a Dozen Men. The Fire was extreme hot for most Part of last Night, by which we lost several of our People.

Bergen-op-Zoom, Aug. 30, N. S. The French sprung a Mine last Night to ruin the Remains of the Lunette of Zealand. It is supposed they intend to erect a Battery of five Guns to batter the Ravelin Dedem. A Deserter reports, that their Companies are diminished from 40 to 18 and 20 Men.

Hague, Sept. 1, N. S. The Earl of Sandwich set out Yesterday Morning for the Army. General Smiffaert was carried off a few Days ago, in Zealand, by a malignant Fever: By his Death, which is greatly lamented, the Government of Boissleduc is become vacant, and is said to be intended for General Cronstrom. The French have not made of late any Progress in their Attacks against Bergen-op-Zoom; they seem to be quite at a Stand, at least above-Ground, and our Miners are hard at Work to defeat their Attempts under-Ground. The Body of Troops under the Command of General Chanclos, arrived at Oudenbosch the Night before last; and the Letters received this Day from Bergen-op-Zoom say, that General Chanclos had been there, and had found the Town in a much better State of Defence than he expected.

Rotterdam, Sept. 1, N. S. Advices from Bergen-op-Zoom continue very favourable: The

The French do not advance so much as they give out; and although they have ruined Part of the Gallery, they have not yet attempted to come into the Fosse. Although we had abandoned the Lunette of Zealand, they would not venture to lodge themselves in it, but by Countermining they ruined it entirely. Their chief Efforts are now against the Lunette of Utrecht. Their Attack of Kyk en de Pot is only thought to be a Feint to cover their making a second and third Parallel of Circumvallation and Contravallation. Advices from Brussels do not fix the Day of the French King's Departure from the Army.

Whitehall, August 25.

The King has been pleased to order a Congé d'Elire to the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Peterborough, empowering them to elect a Bishop of that See, the same being void by the Death of Doctor Robert Clavering, late Bishop thereof; and likewise a Letter, recommending unto the said Dean and Chapter, John Thomas Doctor in Divinity, one of his Majesty's Chaplains in Ordinary, and Canon Residentiary of the Cathedral Church of St. Paul, to be by them elected Bishop of the said See of Peterborough.

Whereas William Marchant, who was committed in Newcastle Gaol, for a Robbery on the Highway, and Pinion, otherwise Tollard, who was a Prisoner in the said Gaol, did, on the 15th Instant, make their Escape, at or near Southborough, in the County of Kent, from a Party of Dragoons, appointed to conduct them to Lewes in Sussex, in order to be try'd at the Assizes lately held there, for the Crimes with which they were respectively charged; His Majesty is pleased to promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds to any Person who shall apprehend the said William Marchant; and the like Sum of One Hundred Pounds to any one, who shall apprehend the said Pinion, otherwise Tollard, so that they, or either of them, may be brought to Justice.

William Marchant is a middle-sized Man, about Five Foot Six Inches high, and about Twenty-five Years of Age. He is of a light brown Complexion; his Face is pretty broad, very much marked with the Small Pox, with a very great Nose, and remarkably hook'd at the Tip; both his Legs are very crooked, and bend remarkably outwards; he wore a blue Butcher's Frock, under a new common white round Frock, and a brown Wig with long Curls.

Chest at Chatham, July 31, 1747.

Whereas at the late General Pay of the Pensioners belonging to the Chest at Chatham, it appeared that John King, Mariner, now residing at or near Portsmouth, one of the Pensioners to the said Chest at 4 l. per Ann. for the Sight of his Left Eye lost on board his Majesty's Ship the Shrewsbury, on the 23d of December 1745. had made Assignments of his Year's
