BY Letters from Turin, we are informed, that the King of Sardinia was to set out on the 21st Instant for Coni, in the Neighbourhood of which Place the Army was to be assembled on the 23d Instant, in order to put himself at the Head, and take the Command of it.

Head Quarters at Richel, Sept. 4, N. S. Nothing new has lately happened with Regard to the Position of the two Armies, excepting that our Hussars carried off Yesterday the Enemies Grand Guard, composed both of Horse and Foot.

Head Quarters at Richel, Sept. 7, N. S. Every Thing remains in the same Position on both Sides; but last Monday the French King ordered the Foreign Ministers should be acquainted, that he would have them think of returning to Paris; in Consequence of which, they all took Leave the next Day, and are said to have set out as this Day on their Return; so that the French King is thought to be on the Point of his Departure. The eldest Prince of Bevern died here of a Flux a few Days since.

Bergen-op-Zoom, Sept. 6, N. S. The Enemy continue their Work in demolishing the Counterscarp in the Front of the Attack. Yesterday they sprung a Mine opposite to the Right Face of the Bastion Pucelle, which broke near sixty Feet of

the Gallery. They are still hard at Work upon the Lunette Zealand. General Swartzenberg is this Moment arrived in Town.

Bergen-op-Zoom, Sept. 7, N. S. We sprung a Mine last Night on the Left Face of the Lunette of Utrecht, which had a very good Effect; it destroyed several Men and a Lodgment which the Enemy had made with great Labour. We made two small Sallies this Morning, one from the Ruins of the Lunette Zealand, the other from that of Utrecht. We killed four or five Men, set many Gabions and Fascines on Fire, brought off several Tools, and had but one Man wounded.

Rotterdam, Sept. 8, N. S. One of the Paymasters of the Highlanders, who left Oudenbosch in the Night, says, that the Generals were out Yesterday reconnoitring, and that it was expected that the Army would move very soon.
