cil, by this his Order in his Privy Council, require and command, that the said John Carbold, James Morley, Thomas Brooks, commonly called Bricklayer Tom, Edward Brook, James Cunningham, commonly called Curse Mother, Robert Cunningham, Charles Blumfield, Henry Chittock, John Oldous, Robert Clarke, commonly. called Plunder, George Potter otherwise Porter, and Thomas Fisher, do surrender himself and themselves, within the Space of Forty Days after the first. Naples, August 22. Last Week an Edict was published by the King's Order, by which his Majesty grants a Pardon to all Runners of Contraband Goods, even those who had been condemned to the Gallies, excepting only those who had attempted to run Goods from Messina and Calabria during the Epidemical Sickness in those Parts.

Florence, August 29. In the Night of the 24th Instant, two Florentine Senators and two Noblemen were arrested by the Bailiss, and delivered afterwards to a Detachment of Soldiers, who conducted them Prisoners to the Castle of St. John Baptist, where they are guarded separately, and no Person is permitted to speak with them without a special Leave from the Regency. They were intrusted with the publick Magazines of Corn in this City, the greatest Part of which has been embezzled, for which a Criminal Process is preparing against them.

Flushing, Sept. 5, O. S. By Advices from Bergen-op-Zoom of the 3d Instant, the Enemy's Fire was very considerable, and the Breaches were widen'd, particularly that of Dedem. The Besieged sprung a Mine under the Tambour of Utrecht, with an Intent to quit it, but it not having had the desir'd Effect, they had again taken Possession of it. And other Advices of the 4th Instant mention, that nothing extraordinary had since happen'd,

only that the Besieged had made a Sally from Dedem to nail up the Cannon which batter'd in Breach, but without Success. The Fire from the Enemy was hotter last Night than it has been yet.
