Stockholm, September 1, O. S.

YESTERDAY at Noon died here Lieutenant General Diederon.

Dresden, Sept. 16, N. S. This Morning his Polish Majesty set out for Weyssenfels, where he is to stay till the Leipfick Fair; from which Place his Majesty intends to go to Hubertsburg, and to return to this Place in the Beginning of December next.

Head Quarters at Richel, Sept. 21, N. S. Yesterday arrived here all the Prisoners which the French had taken at Rocoux, and Laffeld, as also those at Keith in Scotland; and these last have already inlisted in his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland's Regiment. There has not been any Motion made by the Enemy in either of their Armies, since the taking of Bergen-op-Zoom, or have we any certain Accounts of that Affair.

Hague, Sept. 22, N. S. The Army under the Command of General Cronstrom is still at Oudenbosch, and, according to our Advices, the Enemy have not made any Motion since the taking of Bergen-op-Zoom. The French give out, that the Number of Prisoners they had made there amounted to Eighteen hundred Men, besides One hundred and fifty Officers, and that they had buried Twelve

hundred who were killed upon the Spot; but this Account is thought to be exaggerated. The Prince of Orange's Departure for the Army is deferred for some Time, his Presence being thought necessary to put a Stop to the Excesses committed here, and in several other Towns, by the Mob. On Tuesday Night they assembled in this Place, and pillaged a French Taylor's House; but, in order to prevent any farther Disorders, the Burghers, supported by some Horse and Foot, dispersed them; and a Proclamation is preparing to prevent the like Disturbances for the future. The Marquis of Baden Dourlach, Nephew to the Prince of Orange, who has been here for some Time, intends, in a few Days, to embark for England.

Rotterdam, Sept. 22, N. S. According to our Advices Steenberg is not besieged; and there are Letters from that Place which say, that they have not seen any French. Orders are given in the Towns of Holland to press 400 Boats to be dispatched immediately to Nimeguen.
