A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R. **THEREAS our Parliament which we** fummoned to meet at Wes minster on Thuriday the Thirteenth Day of August last, stands proregued to Thursday the Eighth Day of this Instant October, We, by the Advice of our Privy Couneil, do hereby publish and declare, That the faid Parliament fhall be further prorogued on the said Eighth Day of this Instant October, to Tuesday the Tenth Day of November next: And we have given Order to our Chancellor of Great Britain to prepare a Writ Patent under our Great Seal for proroguing the fame accordingly. And we do further hereby declare our Pleasure, That the faid Parliament shall, on the faid Tenth Day of November, be held and fit for the Difpatch of diverse weighty and important Affairs. And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens and Burgeffes, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby Westminster on me laid I enth Day of November next.
