Constantinople, Aug. 29. On the 13th Instant Hagi Mahomet, the Grand Vizier, was fuddenly deposed, and Abdulah Pascha, late Pascha of Cyprus, and fince of Heydin, has had the Seals delivered to him. The Porte is taking all neceffary Precaution, by ordering a large Body of Janizaries, &c. to the Frontier of Persia, and large Quantities of Ammunition and Provision to Erzerum, that they may not be furprized in Cafe the Treaty with the late Schach Nadyr should not be observed by his Succeffor. By Advices from Aleppo of the 7th of August we learn, that the Affairs in India were, in general, very favourable to the Englifh, though Madras was still in the Hands of the French, who had razed all to the Ground, except the Fortifications, and those, it was thought, would be deftroyed before they quitted it. The Garrison of St. David's. after having thrice repulfed a numerous Body of the French, marched and laid Siege to Pondicherry by Land, whilft Commodore Griffin, with feven or eight Ships, blocked up the fame by Sea.
