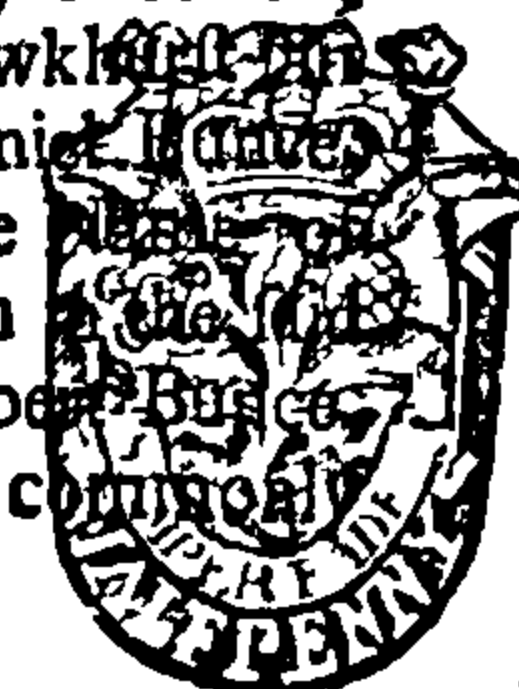

Constantinople, Aug. 29. On the 13th Instant Hagi Mahomet, the Grand Vizier, was suddenly deposed, and Abdulah Pascha, late Pascha of Cyprus, and since of Heydin, has had the Seals delivered to him. The Porte is taking all necessary Precaution, by ordering a large Body of Janizaries, &c. to the Frontier of Persia, and large Quantities of Ammunition and Provision to Erzerum, that they may not be surprized in Case the Treaty with the late Schach Nadyr should not be observed by his Successor. By Advices from Aleppo of the 7th of August we learn, that the Affairs in India were, in general, very favourable to the English, though Madras was still in the Hands of the French, who had razed all to the Ground, except the Fortifications, and those, it was thought, would be destroyed before they quitted it. The Garrison of St. David's, after having three repulsed a numerous Body of the French, marched and laid Siege to Pondicherry by Land, whilst Commodore Griffin, with seven or eight Ships, blocked up the same by Sea.

Copenhagen, Oct. 7, N. S. On Wednesday last the King of Denmark visited the Navy, and reviewed the establish'd Seamen. Count Schulembourg has received the Command of the Horse Guards, in the room of the Duke of Wirtemberg Oels. Count Hohenloe, who had a Regiment of Infantry in this Service, is dismissed with a Pension, and his Command given to Colonel Nostitz.

Head Quarters at Argenteau, Oct. 12, N. S. We have put off our March from hence for one Day only, so instead of To-morrow we shall march on Saturday the 14th Instant.

Liege, Oct. 12, N. S. The Enemy are now behind the Dyle in their Cantonments, and have already detached about 9000 Men to Brittany. The Chief Magistrate of Namur hath received Orders to provide Quarters for 32 Battalions, which are to be sent thither. The French King hath demanded of the County of Namur Five hundred thousand Rations to be immediately furnished. There will remain in Louvain a very large Body of Troops.

Hague, Oct. 13, N. S. We have no late News from Lillo, though, from common Report, the Communication is so interrupted, that it will be difficult to continue to throw in fresh Supplies

Supplies of Provisions. General Hüske, who arrived here the Night before last, with Orders from his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland to settle the Winter Quarters, set out Yesterday Morning for Breda.

Hague, Oct. 13, N. S. The French did not take more than sixty Prisoners at Fort Frederick Hendrick, the Commanding Officer having retreated to Lillo with the rest of his Garrison, when he found that his Post could be no longer maintain'd.

Rotterdam, Oct. 13, N. S. We have Advices, that the Proposal concerning the Succession of the Office of Stadtholder, which was made to the Assembly of Holland by the Nobles, has been likewise made in that of Zeeland, and that the Towns of Terveer and Flushing have already given their Consent.

His Majesty has been pleased to order his Letters Mandatory to the Sub-Dean, or in his Absence to the President and Chapter of the Metropolitan Church of York, to elect John Fountayne, Clerk, Master of Arts, and late one of the Cannons or Ptebendaries of the Free Chapel of St. George in the Castle of Windsor, Dean of the said Church.
