Westminster, November 10.

THIS Day his Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in his Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, the Honourable Mr. Bellenden, Gentleman Usher of the Black-Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers: The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty's Pleasure was signified to them by the Lord Chancellor, that they should return to their House and chuse a Speaker, and present him to His Majesty on Thursday next. They returned accordingly, and unanimously chose the Right Honourable Arthur Onslow, Esq; to be their Speaker.

Naples, October 17. The Duke of Sora, Maggiordomo of the King, after repeated Sollicitations, has obtained Leave to resign his Post, which the King has given to the Prince of Aragona.

Rome, Oct. 21. On the 5th Instant an Edict was published here, inflicting the Penalty of Death on any Person that should enlist Soldiers in this City for the Service of Foreign Princes, even were they Deserters; and to the Deserters a Condemnation of five Years to the Gallies, should they remain above three Days in this City, and eight in the Ecclesiastical State.

Turin, Oct. 28. The French have succeeded in their Attempt to relieve the Castle of Ventimiglia, and we have Accounts of the Enemy's having thrown a Bridge over a River which covers the Posts possessed by Baron Leutrum, and of their having abandoned it, as likewise of a Skirmish, concerning which they write no other Particulars, excepting that the Enemy lost above

200 Men killed and wounded, and the Austrians about 40. Count Soro and Marquis St. Germain have repulsed the Troops sent out of Genoa to attack our Posts on that Side; and though it seems, by our last Accounts, that they are daily reinforced towards the Bochetta, there is no Reason to question M. Nadasti's being able to maintain his Ground.

Hambourg, Nov. 3, N. S. Some Fishing Vessels, being blown lately by a strong Westerly Wind amongst the Islands, which lay between the Elbe and the Weser, the Country People from the Coast, took a Pannick, which communicated itself to the presiding Officer in that District, and the Report, without any farther Consideration, was spread to Stade, even to Hanover, that the French were actually in the Elbe, and preparing to land a Body of Troops.

Hambourg, Nov. 7, N. S. According to the Accounts (which we receive by Way of Russia) relating to the present Troubles in Persia, a Commander in the late Schach Nadir's Army, and his Relation, whose Name was Ali Chouli Chan, has been raised to the Sovereignty, and proclaimed as such in the City of Mesched, by the Title of Adil Schach or the Just Prince; but Affairs are still said to be in great Confusion, and two Factions are raised in Favour of two different Pretenders for the Throne of Persia.

Copenhagen, Nov. 4, N. S. The Weather being now grown cold, their Danish Majesties left Jagersburg on the 2d Instant, and have taken up their Winter's Residence at the Palace of Christiansburg in this City. M. Panin the new Russian Minister, who is to relieve M. Pushkin, arrived here the Day before Yesterday. M. Gram, the Master of the Buck Hounds, is promoted to the Post of Grand Veneur. About the Middle of last Month died Nicholas Fenwick,

Liege, Nov. 3. The French Troops are getting into Winter Quarters as fast as possible. This Day the Hanoverians marched towards the Places appointed them in the Territories of the Republick. Two Regiments of Austrians moved towards Luxemboug, and all, except what stay here, will march in two or three Days to the Quarters assigned them. We hear that every Thing is very quiet at Namur and Louvain, which will probably continue so for some Time, as Marshal Lowendahl sets out in a few Days for Paris.

Liege, Nov. 7. The Town of Cologn have refused giving Quarters to the Imperial Troops; the few Troops which yet remain encamped, are on the Point of separating. This State have dispatched Deputies to his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, humbly to represent their Inability to provide for the Troops which are to have their Quarters in their Districts, having been foraged two Years by both Armies, and supported a heavy Winter Quarter last Year.

Hague, Nov. 7, N. S. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland intends to set out Tomorrow Morning for the Camp at Terheyde. It is imagined that the new Tax will produce much more than was first expected.

Hague, Nov. 10, N. S. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland left this Place last Wednesday Morning for the Camp at Terheyde. M. Chiquet waited a few Days ago upon the Pensionary, with Complaints, in the French King's Name, that no Attention, nor even any Answer had been yet given to the several Memorials sent to their High Mightinesses by the Abbe de la Ville; declaring at the same Time, that he had Orders from his Majesty to insist upon a speedy and categorical Answer, especially to the last Memorial delivered to them. M. Van Haren the younger, Commissary General to the Swiss Troops, set out this Morning for Switzerland, where he is to negotiate, in the Protestant Cantons, several new Battalions, in order to increase, to the Number of 20000 Men, the Troops of that Nation in the Service of this Republick.

Head Quarters at Terheyde, Nov. 10, N. S. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland arrived here Yesterday, and proposes to go Tomorrow to Breda, and in five or six Days to return to England.

Hague, Nov. 14, N. S. The Prince of Orange received last Saturday Night the Resolution of the States of Overysfel, by which they have settled the Succession to the Stadtholdership in the Female Line in his Family in Default of Heirs Male, agreeably to the Proposal made by the Nobles of the Province of Holland. The Town of Amsterdam have conformed to the Resolution of the Nobles, with the Change however of limiting it to the Male Succession

only of the Prince's Daughters; there were several other Restrictions at first proposed, but all were over-ruled, and the Prince of Orange seems as well satisfied as if the Affair had passed in every respect according to the original Proposal. Major General Kinschot has been promoted by the Prince of Orange to the Rank of Lieutenant General, and appointed President of the Council of War, in the room of General Cronstrom. General la Roque continues in close Confinement, and the Prince of Orange has not yet decided upon the Sentence of the Council of War. The Yacht, and Men of War from England, intended for the Use of his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, arrived at Helvoetsluys last Friday.

Rotterdam, Nov. 11, N. S. A Proclamation has been published here by the Prince of Orange's Order, which was sent by three Deputies of the Provincial Assembly of Holland, by which the Promise that the Magistrates were obliged to make to the People of selling all Places and Employments, is annulled, and by it the Burghers are warned never to address their Regents in a tumultuous Manner, and to pretend to prescribe Laws to their Superiors; and that those who shall for the Future be guilty of the like Trespases, shall be punished with the utmost Severity.

Breda, Nov. 14, N. S. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland proposes setting out for the Hague on Thursday, and to proceed soon to England. The Transports are come to Willemstadt, and are putting into Order for the Reception of the Troops, which will embark in about a Week's Time for England.
