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Liege, Nov. 3. The French Troops are getting into Winter Quarters as fast as possible. This Day the Hanoverians marched towards the Places appointed them in the Territories of the Republick. Two Regiments of Austrians moved towards Luxemboug, and all, except what stay here, will march in two or three Days to the Quarters assigned them. We hear that every Thing is very quiet at Namur and Louvain, which will probably continue so for some Time, as Marshal Lowendahl sets out in a few Days for Paris.

Liege, Nov. 7. The Town of Cologn have refused giving Quarters to the Imperial Troops; the few Troops which yet remain encamped, are on the Point of separating. This State have dispatched Deputies to his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, humbly to represent their Inability to provide for the Troops which are to have their Quarters in their Districts, having been foraged two Years by both Armies, and supported a heavy Winter Quarter last Year.

Hague, Nov. 7, N. S. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland intends to set out Tomorrow Morning for the Camp at Terheyde. It is imagined that the new Tax will produce much more than was first expected.

Hague, Nov. 10, N. S. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland left this Place last Wednesday Morning for the Camp at Terheyde. M. Chiquet waited a few Days ago upon the Pensionary, with Complaints, in the French King's Name, that no Attention, nor even any Answer had been yet given to the several Memorials sent to their High Mightinesses by the Abbe de la Ville; declaring at the same Time, that he had Orders from his Majesty to insist upon a speedy and categorical Answer, especially to the last Memorial delivered to them. M. Van Haren the younger, Commissary General to the Swiss Troops, set out this Morning for Switzerland, where he is to negotiate, in the Protestant Cantons, several new Battalions, in order to increase, to the Number of 20000 Men, the Troops of that Nation in the Service of this Republick.

Head Quarters at Terheyde, Nov. 10, N. S. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland arrived here Yesterday, and proposes to go Tomorrow to Breda, and in five or six Days to return to England.

Hague, Nov. 14, N. S. The Prince of Orange received last Saturday Night the Resolution of the States of Overysfel, by which they have settled the Succession to the Stadtholdership in the Female Line in his Family in Default of Heirs Male, agreeably to the Proposal made by the Nobles of the Province of Holland. The Town of Amsterdam have conformed to the Resolution of the Nobles, with the Change however of limiting it to the Male Succession

only of the Prince's Daughters; there were several other Restrictions at first proposed, but all were over-ruled, and the Prince of Orange seems as well satisfied as if the Affair had passed in every respect according to the original Proposal. Major General Kinschot has been promoted by the Prince of Orange to the Rank of Lieutenant General, and appointed President of the Council of War, in the room of General Cronstrom. General la Roque continues in close Confinement, and the Prince of Orange has not yet decided upon the Sentence of the Council of War. The Yacht, and Men of War from England, intended for the Use of his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, arrived at Helvoetsluys last Friday.

Rotterdam, Nov. 11, N. S. A Proclamation has been published here by the Prince of Orange's Order, which was sent by three Deputies of the Provincial Assembly of Holland, by which the Promise that the Magistrates were obliged to make to the People of selling all Places and Employments, is annulled, and by it the Burghers are warned never to address their Regents in a tumultuous Manner, and to pretend to prescribe Laws to their Superiors; and that those who shall for the Future be guilty of the like Trespases, shall be punished with the utmost Severity.

Breda, Nov. 14, N. S. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland proposes setting out for the Hague on Thursday, and to proceed soon to England. The Transports are come to Willemstadt, and are putting into Order for the Reception of the Troops, which will embark in about a Week's Time for England.
