Solemnity, and the Commons being fent for up, gave the Royal Affent to the following Bills, viz.

An Act for granting and continuing to bis Majesty, an additional Duty on Beer, Ale, Strong-waters, Wine, Tobacco, Hides, and other Goods and Merchandizes therein mentioned, and for prohibiting the Importation of all Gold and Silver Lace, except of the Mannfacture of Great Britain.

An Act for granting to bis Majesty an additional Duty on Wine, Silk, Hops, China, Earthen, Japanned, or Lacquered Ware, and Vinegar; and also a Tax of Four Shillings in the Pound on all Salaries, Profits of Employments, Fees and Pensions, to be applied to pay an Interest of Five Pounds per Centum per Annum upon such Part of the Sum of One hundred thousand Pounds, Part of the Sum of Three hundred thousand Pounds formerly raised, and to pay an Interest of Four Pounds per Centum per Annum, upon for the Welfare of this Kingdom; even fuch Part of the Sum of Two hundred and fty thousand Pounds also formerly raised, as shall remain unpaid on the Twenty fifth Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and forty seven; as also to pay an Interest of Four Pounds per Centum per Annum, for fuch Part, of the Sum of Seventy thousand Pounds as bath been or shall be borrowed, pursuant to an AET passed in the last Session of

At the prefenting the two first mentioned Bills, the Speaker of the House of Commons made the following Speech to the Lord Lieutenant.
