Dyon, March 25. The Duke de Navailles (notwithstanding the ill weather) continues his progress into Burgundy, having lately taken Vesoul, a place of great importance, and in it a very great quantity of Provisions for his Army; into it he has put the Regiment of Curialiers, with 300 Foot, under the Command of the Sieur de Feuille, who was falsely reported to be killed at the Siege of Gray.

Versailles, March 30. Yesterday the Sieur de Wingens the Bishop of Munsters Envoy, had an Audience of his most Christian Majesty, to give him thanks, for the great favor shewn his Master, by the putting Zutphen into his hands, and assured him that that Prelate continued most firm to his former Engagements with him and desired the continuance of his Majesties Protection and Favour. The violence done to the Prince of Furstenberg, the Bishop of Cologne's Plenipotentiary, the seizure of the French Money by the Imperial Soldiers, and plundering a Courier of the Comte de Chevilly's, having been long complained of to the Court at Vienna, without any redress, his Imperial Majesty rather inclining to justify the actions (as he seems to do by his answer to the Swedish Ambassadors Memorial upon that subject) the King has intimated to the Mediators, his resolution of recalling his Ambassadors from Cologne, and breaking up that Assembly.

Paris, March 26. Our Letters continue to speak of the conclusion of a stricter Alliance with the Crown of Sweden, and give us these particulars of it; That in case the Emperor, the Crown of Spain, and the States General of the United Provinces, consent not to a Truce before the 15 of May, that then the King of Sweden shall openly declare himself in favor of His Majesty, on condition, that a monthly Subsidy of 50000 Crowns, shall be paid to that Crown by his Majesty, for the space of six years, notwithstanding the Peace be in the mean time concluded. The Bishop of Marseilles appointed by the King to go his Ambassador Extraordinary into Poland, is preparing for his journey. The difference between this Crown and the State of Geneva remains hitherto undetermined, which happens chiefly

by reason of the several Factions in that Government, many of the Senators, and the Duke himself being so greatly inclined to the Spanish Interest, that the French Minister has not been able to obtain satisfaction for the affront which was this last Summer offered to the Kings Galleys; In the interim there be those that very much apprehend the consequence of these misunderstandings. The King will have a very good Fleet this Summer in the Mediterranean; and though the Spaniards tell us, that their Armada shall consist of 30 Men of War, and therbesides, the States General of the United Provinces will likewise send 20 Capital Men of War to joyn with them, yet we doubt not but we shall be able to cope with them.

Paris, March 31. Upon the advice the King has received, of the Imperialists quitting their Winter Quarters sooner than ordinary, and of their advancement in a great Body toward the Lower Pa'azine, that they may block up Philippsburg, and attempt to enter into Alsacia; his Majesty has been pleased to Command Monsieur de Turenne to repair to the Army, to observe the motions of the Enemy, and if he see fit requisites to give them Battle to oppose their progress.
