The King's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

IT is this Day ordered by his Majesty in Council, That all the Rules and Regulations contained in his Majesty's Order of Council of the Eleventh of December last, relating to the Distempered Cattle, together with the several other Rules and Regulations therein referred to, and which were thereby directed to continue in Force until the first Day of February next, be, and they are hereby declared to be further continued, and to remain in full Force for the Space of one Calendar Month, to commence upon the said first Day of February next: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Brussels, January 22, N. S. Marshal Saxe is now at Chambord, from which Place he is expected to return towards the End of this Month.

Brussels, Jan. 24, N. S. There have been sent to Namur, for some Days past, Cloth and Stuffs, and other Necessaries, to new-cloath the Regiments in that City. By Order of Marshal Saxe they are sending several Regiments of Horse, which are quartered about in the Villages, to escort the Convoys which will be going from Antwerp to Bergen-op-Zoom, which is in need of Provisions; they intend to make a large Magazine there if it be possible. Some Days ago there arrived here 35 or 40 Waggons of Powder from Ghent. Recruits arrive from Time to Time to compleat the Regiments; but that Affair goes on very slowly, few in this Country enlisting themselves; the greater Part comes from the Heart of France. Marshal Lowendahl arrived here last Sunday about Seven in the Evening, accompanied by M. d'Alos, Lieutenant of the King at Namur, and Major of Artillery. The Marshal departed at Nine this Morning for Antwerp, attended only by

M. d'Alos's Servants, and a very small Number of his own Domesticks. He is going thither to make the Passage more free, and to render it safe from the Attacks of the Light Troops of the Allies, who are continually carrying off the Provisions which are sent from Antwerp for Bergen-op-Zoom.

Hague, Jan. 26, N. S. Lieutenant General Trips arrived here Yesterday, and is to take the Oaths To-morrow as General of Horse in the Service of the States.

Hague, Jan. 30, N. S. Letters received Yesterday from Gorcum mention, that four Companies of Swiss, of 200 Men each, were arrived there from Schaffhausen, where they had been raised, in Consequence of an Agreement made last Summer with the respective Captains. By Letters received this Day from Breda, we are informed, that Marshal de Lowendahl was arrived at Antwerp, and was preparing to go with a strong Escort to Bergen-op-Zoom.
