Extract of a Letter from Captain Webb, Commander of His Majesty's Ship the Surprize, dated the 26th of January, 1747, in Plymouth-Sound, to Mr. Corbett.

On the 15th Instant, I, together with his Majesty's Ship Rainbow under my Command, were dispatched from Plymouth. The 22d fol-\* lowing, early in the Morning, on my Entrance into the Bay of Biscay, two Sail were discovered steering different Courses; whereupon I made a Signal for the Rainbow to chase the one, whilst I did the like to the other. At Dusk of Evening I came up with her, and obliged her to strike at the Expence of a few Shot. She proves to be a Ship belonging to the French King, called Le Palme, lately fitted out of Brest, bound to fome Part of the West Indies with a Packet; the carries 75 Men, and 12 Carriage Guns.

On the 25th Instant I gave Chace to a Vessel, which I shortly came up with and made strike; proved to be an English Snow, called the Charming Molly, David Young, Master, from Antigua, bound to London; taken on the 23d in the Latitude of 49: 20: No by a French Privateer belonging to St. Maloes, called Le Dauphin Royal, of 20 Guns, and 170 Men. AT the Court at St. James's, the 23d Day of Passenger on board I have received an Account of the Arrival of his Majesty's Sloop Weazle, about nine Weeks since, in English Harbour, upon which Occasion all the English Men of War and Privateers there went in Pursuit of the French Fleet that escaped from Admiral Hawke in the late Engagement, and, in about fix or eight Days following, ten Sail of Merchant-ships were brought in by our Men of War into St. Kit's and St. John's; and relates, that almost every Day they continued to make Captures.

Since my writing the above, I have spoke with a Ship which proves the same I made a Signal for the Rainbow to chase. She is a Privateer called the Conte de Noailles of Granville, mounts 22 Guns, and carries 150 Men: As she was not able, through the Scarcity of Hands on Board, to beat into the Sound, I advised the Commander of her to bear away for Foy or Falmouth, which he has done, together with the retaken West-India-Man.
