*Offens, March.*

**L**All night the Duke of *Villa Hermosa*, General of the Cavalry in these Countreys, arrived at *Bruges* with a Convoy of 600 Horse, on his way to *Norport*, where he is assigned his Post; and the Marquess d' *Assens* *Maistre de Camp* is to have his Quarters at *Bruges*. Yesterday a Merchant-man of this place of 150 Tuns, mounted with 9 Guns, was unhappily castaway, as he was coming in within Pistol shot of the mouth of the Harbor. The Countrey people hereabouts, apprehending the French Arms, for that the season draws on apace, begin to flock hither in numbers daily. It is said here, that at *Bruges* will be 7000 Men in Garrison, most Dutch Troops.

*Naples, March 6.* The twenty seventh past arrived here three Dutch Capers, and brought in with them two prizes, the one an English Pink of 50 Tuns, and the other a French Marchantman of 300 Tuns. To morrow they intend to sail again for *Tunis*, they having advice of several French Vessels that are laden there. This morning the Soldiers that have been raised in this Kingdom, and are designed for *Barcelona*, being in all 2000 Men, began to embark on three Vessels that have long staid here, in order to their transportation; and in three or four days, it is thought, they may be ready to sail. Our Viceroy hath been lately very much indisposed, but is at present pretty well recovered.

*Vienne, March 16.* The Turkish Army that was here, is departed on his return home, charged with the usual presents. The Emperor, we hear, has appointed the Count de *Souches* to command his Army on the *Rhine* this Summer, which some say will consist of 40000 Men. The Swedish Minister here seems little satisfied with the Emperors answer to his Memorial, concerning the violence offered to the Prince of *Furstenbergh*; for that his Imperial Majesty is so far from causing satisfaction to be made to the said Prince, that he justifies the action, and hath commanded the said Prince to be brought prisoner hither; which it is feared, will wholly break up the Conference, which till the seising of this Prince, were held at *Cologne*, in order to the restoring Peace to Christendom. From *Warsaw* we have advice, that there begins to appear a very powerful Faction against the Prince of *Lorrain*, which will be strengthened by the arrival of the Bishop of *Marseilles*, Ambassador Extraordinary from the most Christian King.

*Heydelberg, March 23.* We are endeavoring here what we can, to put our selves into a good posture of defence, and have at present an Imperial Garrison; *Worms* and *Oppenheim* have also received Garrisons for their better security; but the City of *Spire* desires a Neutrality, because of the Tribunal of Justice which is held there of the whole Empire, the Garrisons in all the considerable Posts on the *Neere*, and on the *Rhine*, having been likewise reinforced; so that we seem to have sufficiently provided for the command of the *Palatinate*. The French under the company of Monsieur de *Rochefort*, and the Marquess de *Paubrun*, increase in strength daily; the latter is entred with his Troops into *Philipsburgh*, for that it is thought, the

Imperialists have a design to attempt that place. The Elector *Palatine* has issued an Edict, wherein he commands all his Subjects to oppose the French; and to treat them as publick Enemies; in case they commit any hostility upon them.

*Frankfort, March 25.* The Imperial and other Troops designed for the assistance of the Elector *Palatine* are on their march, and many of them have reached the places they were designed to, though the weather has been very bad, and rendered their march very incommodious. The Elector *Palatine* is at present at *Mannheim*, to confer shere with the Count de *Céprati*, who commands in chief the Auxiliary Troops. The Circle of *Franconia* has sent 1000 Foot, and they of *Nuremberg* 100 Horse to serve his Electoral Highness, in case the French shall attempt any thing farther upon him. In the mean time the French fortifie themselves at *Germerstein* and *Lantaw*; and with the help of the Troops they expect from *Lorraine*, doubt not, but they shall be able to make their party good. The 23 instant the old Duke of *Lorraine* parted hence with his whole family; it is said, that he is going to put himself at the head of an Army, to act with it, according to the Treaty concluded between him, the Emperor, the King of *Spain*, and the States General of the *United Provinces*. Prince *Willem* of *Furstenbergh* some days since passed by this place towards *Bohemia*; having with him a Guard of 70 Horse; they traversed the Countrey of *Fulda*, and the Territories of *Saxony*; not thinking it safe, it seems, to pass through the Electorate of *Bavaria*.

*Cologne, March 27.* The Swedish Minister at *Vienne* having presented a Memorial to the Emperor, to complain of the violence offered to the Prince of *Furstenbergh*, and to desire he might be restored to his liberty, &c. the Emperor cued an Answer to be made, to this effect, That his Imperial Majesty never knew that the said Prince of *Furstenbergh* was invested with any Character of Ambassador or Plenipotentiary by any Prince concerned in the Negotiations of Peace; and that if he had known thereof, he would certainly not have suffered, that a Natural born Subject of the Empire should take upon him any employment contrary to the Interests of his Imperial Majesty; That the said Prince commands a Regiment in the service of *France*; That he has not obeyed the Imperial Mandate, by which his Imperial Majesty commanded all the Vassals and Subjects of the Empire, to quit all such Foreign service as they were engaged in; That he has fomented the War, and hindered the Peace so necessary to Christendom. To which, the Mediators here have answered, That the said Prince was acknowledged Plenipotentiary at this Treaty for the Elector of *Cologne*; That the Regiment which he is said to have in *France*, has for these three years past, been put over into the service of the Elector of *Cologne*; and that the said Prince has only the title, not command of Colonel, in the same manner as the Cardinal d' *Arragon* has a Regiment in *Spain*; and that for other matters, they doubt not, but the innocence of the said Prince will be made fully to appear, and therefore pray, That the Emperor

Emperor by his farther detention will not occasion the breaking up of the Conferences here, which might otherwise, by the Blessing of God, restore so necessary a Peace to Christendom. In the mean time, the Ambassadors of England, as likewise those of France, are in expectation to receive their Orders suddenly to return home.

*Brussels, March 27.* On Friday night last was apprehended here a Citizen of this place, and committed close prisoner, for designing to betray the Fort *Monvere* into the hands of the French: He hath been put upon the torture, and confesses the whole design, which, as we are told, was laid thus. This person had declared himself to the Governor of the Fort, to be a Wine Merchant, and that he had a parcel of Wine as much as would lade twenty Waggons, which he desired to bring in without paying the custom; and therefore agreed with the Governor for a piece of Money to permit the said Waggons to pass in the night: About forty or fifty stout fellows well armed, though disguised in the habit of Carriers, and other Country people, were to accompany the Waggons, who coming to the Fort, were to cut the throats of the Garrison, and Governor there, and at the same time a Body of 4 or 5000 French Horse were to be ready at hand, to take possession of the Fort, and thence to march directly hither. This design was to have been executed on *Goodfriday* night, but was happily discovered some days before. Whether all these particulars may be believed for a certain truth, we cannot determine; but give you them as they are reported here. Colonel *Masselli* who commanded at *Gray*, is arriv'd here, and imputes the loss of the place to the *Swissers* that were in Garrison there, for that they refused to fight. The *Marschal d'Humieres* is returned to his Government of *Liste*, the *Marschal de Belfonds* is gone to command at *Maeffrichi*, the Count *d'Estrades* is to be Governor of *Wifels*, and the Count *de Lorge* Governor of *Nimmegen*. The French seem to have three places in their eye, which they design the object of their Arms at the opening of the Campaign, viz. *Namur, Mons, and Bruges*. This day his Excellency received advice from the *Hague*, That the Prince of *Orange* will, in few days, cause 25 Regiments to march hither, which are to be disposed into several Garrisons, and our old Regiments of *Spiriards, Italians, and Walloons*, are to be drawn into the Field.

*Amsterdam, March 30.* The Admiralty here hastens all they can the Equipage, and, we hope, our Fleet will be ready to sail the latter end of the next Moneth. Our last Letters from *Groningen* tell us, That the *Sieur Rubenhaus* was entred with the Forces under his command into *Munsterland*, and that he intended to join with several Imperial Troops commanded by *Major General sporke*, in order to the attempting something considerable upon the *Bishop of Munster*, who for several Moneths past has freed his Countreys from hostilities, by appearing desirous to make an accord with the Emperor, though at the same time he meant nothing less: The States have therefore now resolved, that they will not give ear to any further Propositions which may be made to them on the part of the said *Bishop*, till he hath first received an Imperial Garrison into his Capital City of *Munster*.

*Hague, March 30.* On Tuesday last the States of *Holland* were assembled, though it was only to confirm what they had done at their last Session, and particularly to take a final resolution, concerning the present of Two Millions to be made to the Prince of *Orange*; the thing passed without the least contradiction, and his Highness was himself in the Assembly of the States, to give them thanks. The States of this Province are now again separated, and will not meet till *June next*, 40-

less some extraordinary business happen. The Deputies of *Zealand* are returned home, having adjusted the affair concerning the uniting the Courts of Justice of the two Provinces: The said Deputies have consented that the state of the War for this present year, shall be augmented with 10000 Foot, and 24 Troops of Horse. The Waters being now clear of Ice, the Troops designed for *Flanders*, will in a day or two embark, the Vessels being already prepared for their transportation, The fifteenth of the next Moneth is appointed for the General Rendezvous of the Troops of this State; and the Prince of *Orange* pretends he will have in the Field Thirty two Regiments of Foot, each Regiment consisting of Twelve Companies, and 10000 Horse; not reckoning the Troops which are designed to be put out board the Fleet, which it is said will be 10000 Men. The *Velt Marshal Wurix* is made choice of to command these Troops in chief, and he hath accepted thereof, desiring in the mean time leave to make a step to *Hamburgh*, to look after his private affairs, which his Highness has granted him.

*Harwich, March 27.* We formerly told you of a Dutch *East India* Ship outward bound, who by stress of weather was forced on the Coast of *Scotland*, and that Captain *Wetwang* having notice thereof, went out in search of her: Captain *Wetwang* being come upon the Coast, found her there, and took her, and yesterday passed by this place with his prize, towards the River of *Thames*. The two Dutch Captains having by a small Vessel been set ashore here; the one commanded the Ship, and the other a Company of Soldiers designed to the *East Indies*; the said Captains are gone over in the Packet Boat for *Holland*, and report this Ship to be worth about 50000 *l. sterling*.

*Whitchal, March 28.* The twenty three instant, the Baron *Spar*, Ambassador Extraordinary of *Sweden*, arrived here from *Cologne*, by the way of *Holland*; his Excellency hath since had Audience of their Majesties; and their Royal Highnesses, having been conducted thereunto by *Sir Charles Cotterel*, Master of the Ceremonies, with the usual solemnity.
