H E Chevalier de Vial, Captain of a Free Company in the Republick's Service, furprized and took, a few Days ago, a French Detachment of 50 Men, posted at Little Willebrock, on the other Side of the Nethe, between Antwerp and Mechlin, and funk fome Boats laden with Forage for the French Troops:

Hague, March 8, N. S. This Morning her Royal Highness the Princels of Orange was happily delivered of a Prince. Major General Had. dich affembled, a few Days ago, a great Numher of Waggons, and carried off about 550 Bomb-shells, and 600 Twenty-sour Pound Cannon Balls from the Glacis of Bergen-op-Zoom, without the Lofs of a Man, though the Ramparts were all lighted; and the Garrifon under Arms in Expectation of a Surprize. Hagae, March 12, N.S. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland arrived here, in persect Health, on Saturday in the Evening. The four Plenipotentiaries of the States took their Leave of their High Mightinesses last Friday, and are now upon the Road for Aix la Chapelle. Hague, March 15, N. S. This Day the Council of State presented a Petition to the States General for the Sum of 1,700,000 Florins for the Subfiftance of the Ruffian Troops. The States of Holland refumed their Affembly Yefferday, according to their Adjournment. Her Royal Highness the Princess of Orange, and the young Prince, continue in perfect Health. Count Chavanne left this Place Yefterday; in order to repair to Aix la Chapelle.

All the Troops of each Nation behaved extremely well, according to the General's Account; and Major Lorenti, of the Regiment of Soubiron, who received three Wounds in the Action, particularly diftinguished himself.

The Troops employed in this Expedition went through very great Fatigues, which, however they furmounted with great Alacrity, and not the least Appearance of Murmur. M. Groothusen, Captain in the Electoral Troops of his Britannick Majesty, is mortally wounded, and is Prisoner at Bergen-op Zoom.

I impatiently wait for Orders what is to be done with the Prifoners, who are all here, as I with very much to be foon rid of them. The Enemy defired Leave to bury their Dead this Morning, which was granted them. The reft of the Convoy, with all the Efcorte, which came from Antwerp, entred Bergen op-Zoom at Night, from whence they returned the next Day.

Whitehall, March 12. • The following Extract of a Letter from the Prince of Wolfenbuttel to bis Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, inclosing a Relation of the Attack of the grand French Convoy near Bergen-ap-Zoom, the 15th Instant, N. S. by the Allied Troops, was received Yesterday from bis Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland. The Printe of Branswick's Relation of the Attack of the Great French Convoy near Bergen-op-Zoom, by the Troops of the Allies, the 15th of March N. S. 1748.

Having received certain Advice, that the great Convoy, which the Enemy had been preparing at Antwerp for fix Weeks paft, was to fet out from thence for Bergen-op-Zoom between the 14th and 15th Inftant : I refolved to reinforce General Haddich with feveral Detachments from the Regiments that were neareft him, as also with two Companies of Grenadiers, and four Pieces of Cannon.

The Rendezvous was on the 14th, at Four o'Clock in the Afternoon, at Sprundel, from whence they went on the fame Evening to Rofendal, and entered that Town after Sun-fet, in order to conceal their March from the Enemy.

At the fame Time 700 Men, who had been till then under the Orders of General Haddich at Kalfsdonk, were reinforced by the fame Number, under the Pretext of relieving them. The advanced Posts having reported on the 14th, towards the Evening, that the Enemy's great Convoy was fet out from Antwerp, and marching towards Sandvliet, General Haddich marched out of Rosendal at Three o'Clock in the Morning with all his Troops, and about Eight arrived in the Downs or Sandhills, at half a League's Diftance from Bergen op Zoom. This March was extremely fatiguing for the Troops, by reason of the Inundation and deep Mud, which the Infantry, though already tired with their March of the Day before, were obliged to wade through almost up to the Knees. General Haddich, to whom alone the Honour of this Day is due, made the following Dispositions. He left in Referve upon the High Road to Bergen-op-Zoom, the Major of the Imperial Regiment of Waldeck, with 600 Men and four Pieces of Cannon, which were to observe the Garrison of Bergen-op-Zoom, and cover big Rear, and marched himfelf with the relie of his-Troops, in three Columns, towards the schelder to the High Road by which the means the second states the second states and the second s

Extract of the Prince of Wolfenbuttle's Letter to bis Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland, dated at Breda the 17th of March, 1748, N.S.

SIR,

I Take the Liberty to enclose your Royal Highness herein the Relation of General Haddich's having attack'd, the 15th Instant, the Enemy's Convoy between Hogessheyden and Bergen-op-Zoom, of which his Excellency the Marshal will have given your Highness already a short Account.

Your Royal Highnels will excule my not having given you immediately an Account of this Event, but as I had not till now the Detail of all-the Particulars, I chose to defer it till I could acquaint your Royal Highnels with all the Circumstances of it. I cannot sufficiently commend the good Dispositions, the Prudence, Bravery and Activity of General Haddich, to whom One thousand Croats took their Way through the Sandhille, a like Number of Fusileers, ranged in two Battalions, with the two Companies of Grenadiers, one of Botta, and the other of the Imperial Regiment of Waldeck, marched to the Right along the Sandhills; and the third Column, confisting of 400 Huffars, fustained by 300 Cuiraffiers of the Imperial Regiment of Diemar, marched in Squadrons to the Right of the Infantry along the Plain. In this Order they arrived at the High Road about half an Hour past Ten in the Morning.

The Garrison of Bergen-op-Zoom having discovered our Troops at a Distance, and sufpecting our Design, sent out a confiderable Detachment, as well to suffain the Convoy, is attacked, as to put General Haddich between two Fires.

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The Detachment which was headed by the Deputy Governor of Bergen-op Zoom, Count de Vaux, got the Start of our Troops by about a Quarter of an Hour, in taking Poffession of a very advantageous Post, which it was absolutely nec fl ry for us to have, in order to attack the Convoy. This Post was in a little Hill, which formed in the Infide a kind of natural Entrenchment, wherein the Enemies were quite covered. Gen ral Haddich feeing the Importance of the Post, and that it must be taken before the Convoy should come up, ordered it to be attacked in such Manner, that the Croats were to pass quietly amongst the Sandhills, whilst the two Companies of Grenadiers, fuftained by a Battalion of Men, should attack the Enemy on the 'Left; and the Huffars fuftained by the Company of Carabiniers of Diemar, fall in upon them in Flank and Rear. This Attack was executed with fo much Spirit and Expedition, that the Enemy had fcarce Time to make four Discharges of their Cannon. The Infantry, which was headed by Major d'Elmendorff, of Botta's Regiment, an Officer of Merit, and who has particularly diftinguished himself on this Occasion, broke thro' immediately; as did likewile the Croats commanded by Captain Claskowitz, who has now fignalized himself for the third Time in attacking Con voys. They made themselves Masters of two Pieces of the Enemy's Caunon, who being dri wen from this Post, retired in very great Confusion towards the Ditches and broken Ground; but before they could reach them, fell in among the Cavalry and Hussians, who cut the greatest Part of them to pieces, and made the reft Prisoners. The great Convoy having come up during this Interval as far as the Sandhills, their Van Guard advanced with great Precaution, and the Convoy followed close after, intermixed with Platoons of Infantry. As fast as the Waggons came out of the narrow Way, they were ranged in a Barricade, and the Escorte put themselves in order at the Head of them. General Haddich immediately ordered his fecond Battalion to advance, under the Command of Major Lorenti of the Hanoverian Regiment of Soubiron, fustained by Major Seckendorff, at the Head of 200 Cuiraffiers of Diemar, in order to take Possession of the Heights of the great Road and of the Downs; and in the mean Time a great Number of Prifoners, and the two Pieces of Cannon were fent to the Referve. After having rallied his Troops from the Purfuit of those that fled, he attacked the Convoy in one Place with 800 Foot, and at another with the Bannalistes, whilst the Hussars put it in The five Soundrone, which the

Pieces, and their Infantry at the fame Time dispersed among the great Number of Waggons, of which many were taken, and the greatest Part destroyed, the Peasants having fled with their Horses, and the Time being too short to get others.

During this Action, General Haddich-reaceived a Report, that a large Detachment of the Garrifon of Antwerp, with a confiderable Body of Horfe, had joined the Rear of the Convoy. And as this Reinforcement might eafily have intercepted his Troops, that were pretty far advanced between the Schelde and the Sandhills, by forcing its March over the Heaths, under Favour of the then Fog, General Haddich refolved to affemble his Troops, and retire to Rofendal; which was accordingly done in very good Order, the Battalion of Referve and the Cavalry bringing up the Rear.

We have taken from the Enemy a great Number of Horned Cattle, Hogs, and Sheep, and a large Quantity of Salt Meat.

The Number of Prisoners is as in the following Lift. On our Side we have had 12 killed, 89 wounded, and 27 milling. Among the first, are the brave Rupp, Captain of Grenadiers of the Imperial Regiment of Waldeck, a Captain of the Regiment of Bethlem, and Enfign Schlepegrel of the Hanoverians. Major Lorenti, who distinguished himself much, as also Captain Grothusen of the Hanoverians, are mortally wounded. General Haddich cannot sufficiently express the good Conduct of the Officers, and the Valour and Bravery with which all the Troops of every Nation fought for above three Hours without Intermission, notwithstanding the Difficulties of the Ground, and the Fatigue of the March. He gave great Praises to the Bannalistes, as likewife to the Huffars, who diftinguished themselves much, under the Command of Count Teleki, as well as the 200 Cuiraffiers under Major Seckendorff, and Captain Hoffman, who at the Head of his Company of Carabineers made a large Body of Infantry lay down their Arms. These are the Circumstances which General Haddich has reported to me of this fuccessful Action, which does him much Honour, and in which Prudence and Courage were equally req ired to overcome an Enemy by much superior to him in Force, and fuftained by the numerous Garrifons of the neighbouring Fortreffes.
