*Naples, March 12, N. S.*

**O**N the 1st Instant the Duke of Medina Celi, having taken Leave of their Majesties; departed from this City on his Return to Spain by Land.

*Rome, March 16, N. S.* Last Week the Bali de Tencin, the Maltese Ambassador, had an Audience of the Pope; to acquaint him of the Arrival, at Malta, of a Turkish Galley, with the Bashaw of Rodi, and about 250 Christian Slaves on board, who having mutinied and made themselves Masters of the said Galley, had brought the Bashaw, his Retinue and Baggage, into the above Port. On the 4th Instant the Pope nominated Count Suofuof Archbishop of Breslaw in Silesia, and the next Day a Courier was dispatched to him with the Bulls for the said Archbishoprick.

*Copenhagen, March 16.* By a Letter arrived this Day from Norway, there is Advice; that the French Privateers have already begun to cruize again in the Northern Seas: According to the said Advice, a British Ship called the Blessing of Aberdeen, Walter Gordon, Master, was sent into Bergen on the 22d past, having been lately taken in the Firth of Forth by the *Sufannah* of Calais.

*Florence, March 19, N. S.* The Treaty of Commerce, which was lately stipulated between the Emperor, as Great Duke of Tuscany, and the Potts, has been just published here by Order from the Regency.

*Venice, March 22, N. S.* The Marquis de Prié, the Imperial Ambassador, has lately obtained Leave of the Government to purchase here a considerable Quantity of Corn for the Service of the Army, which will soon be compleat, 16,000 Recruits being already arrived, and some Thousands more on their March. General Brown will begin his Operations the Beginning of next Month.

*Vienna, March 23.* The four Regiments of Austrian Horse, to be taken into the Pay of his Britannick Majesty and the States-General, are in Motion.

*Hague, April 5, N. S.* The Young Prince of Orange is to be baptized next Thursday, and the States of Holland are settling the Ceremony of that solemn Act. The Council of State have appointed M. Verelst, one of their Members, to be their Deputy at the Army during the Campaign; and last Night he set out for Oudenbosch in Company with General Burmania. General Ligonier left this Place this Morning, and Marshal Bathiani designs to set out Tomorrow. The Chevalier de Vial, who has been of late so active against the French, was

arrested, and brought Prisoner to this Place, a few Days ago, under a strong Guard. It is said, his Disgrace is owing to some Enactions in the Barony of Breda, if not to unlawful Correspondence with the Enemy.

The King has been pleased to promote William George, Doctor in Divinity, and one of his Majesty's Chaplains in Ordinary, to the Deanry of Lincoln; void by the Resignation of Dr. Thomas Cheyney late Dean thereof.

The King has been pleased to grant unto Theophilus Lowe, Clerk, Master of Arts, a Prebendary's Place in his Majesty's Collegiate Church or Free Chapel of Windsor, void by the Resignation of Dr. William George, late Prebendary thereof.
