Vienna, March 27, N.S.

ARON Ketlar, who was sent to meet the Russians, is fallen ill in Upper Sile-sia, and Count Willsheg, another Chamberlain; will be dispatched in his Room. Some Advices from Poland make us apprehend, that they will not be even at Bilitz before the End of the next Month; but others give us Hopes that they may be at Ol-

mutz by that Time.

Copenhagen, April 2, N. S. The Anniverfary of his Danish Majesty's Birth-day falking out this Year on Sunday the 3 ist past, the Celebration of it was deferred till Yesterday, and then performed with great Magnificence and all posfible Demonstrations of Joy. The Knights of the two Orders appeared at Court in their respective Habits of Ceremony, the Ladies in Robes à la Romaine, and a very numerous Company of both Sexes were entertained in the Drawing-Room with Mulick and a Play, and afterwards with a Supper at the King's Table, but it being so near the Holy Week there was no Ball. On this Occasion General Schulemburg. was promoted to the Dignity of Feldt Marshal; General Numsen, General Lerche, M. Gersdorff, M. Raben, and M. Claus Reventlau, were invested with the Order of the Elephant.

Liege, April 6, N.S. The Troops which were at Chinay proceeded to Marche en Famine the 2d Instant, and were there joined by the Garrison of Givet, and two other Swiss Battalions. At the same Time M. de Segur was in March with another Division and 24 Field Pieces, while some other Troops from the three Bishopricks, Lorraine, Alsace, &c. came to join him by different Roads, as had been before concerted. The 2d Instant M. de Lowendahl joined the Army at Marche en Famine, and afterwards proceeded by Hotton to Boumal, where the Head Quarter was the 4th; and last Night M. de Lowendahl lay at Auwaille. While the Troops; marched towards Marche en Famine, a Detachment was sent to Great Mondane to cover their Flank, and returned as soon as they were! passed. On the 4th Instant, at Four in the Morning, they sent from Namur four Pontons, four Mortars, eight small Cannon, and 100 Waggons with Ammunition of all Kinds; they followed the same Road the Army had marched; and this Convoy was covered by 100 Men posted at Andenne. We are informed that M. de Lowendahl halts To-day at Auwaille; he hath Posts all along the River Outre, and hath advanced a Party to Biausaye. The Austrians have Posts along the Weze, and To-morrow their Troops camp between Wyck and Berg. Marshal Saxe arrived this Day at Tongres.

Hague, April 9, N.S. Count Waitensseben is to set out To-morfow for Bonne, with final Instructions relating to the Negociation which has been so long depending, for a Body of the Elector of Cologn's Troops. He is likewife to negociate for another Battalion with the Margrave of Baden Baden. The States General have appointed M. Van Haren the elder Brother, their Deputy to attend upon his Royal Highness the Duke, in order to facilitate the Operations of the Campaign as far as the Power of their High Mightinesses can extend. The Council of War have given their Opinion to the Prince of Orange Concerning the Behaviour of M. Van Echten, the late Governot of Menin; in Consequence of which he is to be broke, and declared incapable of ever ferving in any military Capacity. This Morning M. de la Calmette was nominated Resident to the Protestant Cantons.
