Dantzick, March 26.

Ost people are extreamly inquisitive after the present transactions in Poland, to know with what success the several Interests are managed in relation to the approaching Election; but the Grandees of that Kingdom are so referved, and make not the least discovery of their intentions, that we are not, as yet, able to inform our selves, which of the Candidates stands fairen for the Crown, How the Crown General Sobietski is affected, we cannot with any certainty learn; but this is fure, That he has a great interest as well among the Senators, as the other Nobility, and which way he inclines, will carry great weight with them : Many are of opinion, That he himself, though privately, as yet, aims at the Crown; but this is certain, That he does not favor the Prince of Lorraine, having always been of the contrary faction. The news we receive from the Whraine, is, That Caminiee, which was once reduced to great extremity for want of Provisions, & . had been relieved by the Turturs, who had supplied them with all things nedeflary; that, in the mean time, the Arms of Molcovy have made agreat progress in the Wheaine; having taken Cz cherin, the Residence of Dorosensto, and several other places, that were possesssed by him, he himself being forced to secure his person by flight; but was still purfued by the Moscovites.

Legko ne, March 26. We have here the good news of the Conclusion of a Pe ce between His Majesty of Great Britain, and the States General of the United Provinces. Four Dutch Men of War are arrived here in twelve days from Gadiz, and in as many more they purpose to return again, with sich Dutch Marchant men as are designed for that place: Here is likewise atrived an English Marchant Man in forty days from Scandaroon. pire, to be reflored to his Electoral Highness when the present War shall be ended, provided his Electoral Highness make good the several Articles of the Treaty, concluded between his Majesty, and his Electoral Highnef . The Marquels of Vaubrun is at present at Lundaw, which place, as likewise Hagensu, he is at prefent about fortifying: At Germerstein, the French have caused the Walls of the Town to be demolished, they intending only to keep the Caille; Four hundred men are sent to Philipsburgh, to reinforce the Garison there, for, that the French greatly apprehend the Imperialits will attempt that place fo foon as they fee their opportunity. Great quantities of Ammunicion, and other Military Provisions are daily brought down from Newcy to Brifac. Some here in Town pretend to have news, that 2000 French have attacked Bern Castle near Treves, but that they have been repulsed.

Francfort April 1. We expected here to have heard, That the feveral Troops, as well Imperialists. Saxony, as others, that marched to the affiltance of the Elector Palatine, upon the French taking Germerstein, would upon their arrival in the Palatinate, have joyned together, and attempted fomething confiderable upon the French; but hitherto they have not critred upon any action, but have divided themselves into several places to secure them against the French. From Vi nil we hear, That they make there great prepara-tions in order to the bringing a powerful Army into the Field, and many report that it will consist in above 40000 alen, which others very much doubt.

Cologne, April 6. We are told, that the fourthinstant the French Ambassadors received orders from the King their Master, to leave this place, and to return home, which they, the next day, communicated to the Mediators, and the other Ambassadors: The former endeavor what they can to delay their departure, at least, till the return of the Courrier which they lately fent to Vienna, who they hope will bring them a more fatisfactory answer from the Emperor, in the matter re-lating to the Prince of Fu ft. nbergh; in the mean time it is faid, That if the Treaty be continued, it will be transferred to some other Neutral place: This having manifeltly violated the Neutrality. The Bishop of strasburgh is at present at Keyserwart, and between that place and Nuts, are sifteen Troops of French Horse. who are working there at a Retrenchment. From the Pala ina:e we have advice, That the French have reinforced the Gatison of Milipsburgh, and that they fortise Landaw, and other places; and that the Imperior rial and Saxon Proops are Garisoned in the several places of the Palatinate.

From the Conquered places we hear, That several Regiments were ordered to march towards Lorraines to form the Army to be commanded by Monsieur de Turenne in those parts. From Grave they write of the seventh instant, That the Mareschal de Bellefonds having flaid some days at Maestriche, and in the Neighborhood, passed the fifth instant through that place towards Nimmegen; where he arrived the next day; the Cavalry which waited upon him for a Convoy, being gone into the County of Zu phen. Tie faid Marefehal will, it is laid, have a flying Army of 10000 Men, to be ready at hand to affilt the Bishop of Munifer upon all occasions: The French will certainly quie Tiel 3 Zutphen they will put into the hands of the Bishop of Munster ; but the Fort of S: Andre they will retain in their own hands. The Count of Lorge goes, to ferve in Monsieur de Turennes Army, From Mavaigne they write, That a parcy of that Garifon, being abroad, had the good fortune to surprise a Convoy going from Liege to Miestr cht. Here is arrived an Extraordinary Courriet from Spain, bringing with him feveral Orders and Instructions to our Governor, relating to the management of the War. Yesterday morning the Prince of Berbungon went from Bruges to Newhors, in order to his embarkation there for England, whither he goes to complement His Majelly on occasion of the Peace.

Hague, April 6. We now find that the report of the French being about to put Wefel into the hands of the Elector of Brandenburgh, is without any ground. The Prince of Orange haltens the preparations all he can, and we hope he will be in the Field, even before the Frenche. The Minister which relides on the part of this Stare at Stockholme, has lately written, That he has fome reason cochope he shall succeed in his Negociation there; that the Regents had labely fent to the Count of Starenberg, the Imperial Minister to acquaint hims Mar the King had fent orders to his Ministers to use their withoff endeavors with the most Christian King, to Induce his Majelly to admit of the Deputies of the Duke of Larraine, ias Principals at the Congress at Galogue, From whence we have advice, That the Treaty offareommodation between the Emperor and the Elector of Calogne, feems wholly at a fland, for that the Exector will include therein the Prince of Eurstenbeech, and his Brother the Bishep of Strachurgh, which alle Emperial Ministers will not admit of. Ditto, April 9. Our advices concerning the Frenches delivering up Wefel to the Elector of Brangenburgh have of lace been very different; for one while it was faid. That they were about quitting the place, and prefently after it was again contradicted. The ninth inflant Prince Murice of Noffen received Letters, which gave him an account, that the fourth instant the French Garilon drew out from thence, and that at the same time Colonel sibourg had taken possession thereof in the name of the Elector of Brandenburgh: It is likewife reported. That the French will do the like with Rees, and that they will suddenly quit all the other places in those parts, Muestrichtexcepted. It is very cerrain, that they are removing their Ammunition, Victuals. Sec. from Aernheim to Nimmegen, which makes us believe, that they will in few days likewise abandon that place. Yellerday in the evening arrived here the Marquels d'Affentur from Bruffels, being fent by the Count de Monterey to concert with the Prince of Orange, the deficins of the Campagne, the Succors which on occasion are to be fent to each other, and the Rendezvous of the several Armies, it being resolved, That they shall act separately. We have advice, That Monsieur Rabenhaups having descated 1000 Munster Horse, was afterwards marched to Nieuwenbuyfen, and that on Saturday last he had taken it by storm.
