G O D Save the K I N G.

Naples, May 7, N. S. Last Week a Person arrived here from Mahon, to purchase 900 Oars; but on Information received by the Court, that they were designed to fit out 15 Shebecks from Port-Mahon, the King gave Orders immediately to the General of the Gallies to forbid the Master Builders, Carpenters, &c. under the Penalty of Life, not to enter into any Contract, or to permit the Exportation of Oars. The King's Frigate is fitting out with all Diligence for Constantinople, to conduct back to Naples the

Chevalier Mayo, the King's Minister at the Porte. On the 2d Instant arrived in this City Count Policastro, from his Confinement in the Citadel of Messina.

Rome, May 11, N. S. M. Marshal, a French Engineer, has presented to the Secretary of State a Draught and Plan for refitting the Port d'Anzio, in order to be laid before the Pope for his Approbation.

Florence, May 14, N. S. Last Week a Detachment of the French Troops seized all the Cattle and Provisions they could find in the Dutchy of Massa and Carrara, which they carried to the Spetia, in order to provide themselves against any Attempts the Austrians should make against that Fortrefs, which has greatly distressed that Country, insomuch that they have neither Cattle to work the Land, or for their Subsistence. The Accounts received by this Day's Post from the Austrian Army are, that they have halted on the Mountains of Parma, in order to assemble their Troops, and to receive the Necessaries, so as to proceed to the designed Operations. On the 12th Instant the Marquis Malaspina passed by this City from Naples for Dresden, where he is going as Envoy from the King of the Two Sicilies to the King of Poland. The Letters which arrived this Evening from Pontremoli, dated May 11, advise, that on the Motion of the Austrians, the French are fortifying Sarzana, and have formed an Encampment of about 14,000 Men between Sestri and Matterana on the Confines of Massa towards Varese, where the Duke of Richelieu arrived on the 8th, and has put the Country People under Arms, and designs to form another Encampment at Ciparana near the River Magra, in order

der to be near at Hand to succour Sarzana, and to dispute the Passage of that River with the Austrians. A Body of 5000 Austrians are extended to Bereeto, as another is of 7000 to Borgo Taro, commanded by General Maguire, with their Field Artillery, and are to be joined by a larger Number, and designed for Varese. Another Body is to march by Corniglio and Fivizzano. On the 7th Instant General Ciceron return'd Post to Parma, being sent for by General Brown to hold a new Council of War; and Orders are given to the Troops to halt till farther Orders.

Nuremberg, May 24, N. S. Mr. Burish, his Britannick Majesty's Minister to several Princes and Circles of the Empire, returned hither some Days ago from the Court of Anspach; and on the 20th Instant the Hereditary Prince of Anspach set out for Utrecht, to enter upon his Studies in that University. His Highness is attended by his Governor on Bobenhau sen, and Baron Sckendorff the Younger, Privy Counsellors to his most Serene Highness the Margrave. Four Regiments of Imperial Cavalry, who were upon their March for the Allied Army in the Low-Countries, are countermanded; and that of Luchesi, which was advanced as far as Amberg upon the Frontier of this Circle, is ordered to march back into Bohemia.

On Sunday Evening Mr. Lucas, one of his Majesty's Messengers, arrived from Holland at his Grace the Duke of Newcastle's Office, who gives an Account, that he met the Yachts with his Majesty about four Leagues distant from the Ghoree on Saturday last in the Afternoon.

St. James's, May 22.

This Day Signior Il Cavaliero Capello, Ambassador in Ordinary from the most Serene Republick of Venice, had a private Audience of Leave of her Royal Highness the Princess Amelia, to which he was introduced by Sir Clement Cottrell Dormer, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.
