Cracow, May 14.

MAJOR General Stuart, and one Regiment of the Russian Troops, are arrived here. They march at present in two Columns, and by single Regiments Day after Day. Both Officers and private Men have a good Appearance; the Men are not tall but strong made, and of an Age to support the Fatigues of their long March.

Cracow, May 19. Prince Repnin, the Russian General, arrived here this Morning, and six Regiments of the Russian Troops are come in.

Berlin, May 28. The King of Prussia is returned from Potzdam, and has been engaged for two Days past in reviewing his Army. It is said the Reviews will last for two Days longer, and that soon after his Majesty will return to Potzdam.

Dresden, May 29, N. S. The King and Queen of Poland left this Place on Monday last, and went towards Warsaw, where their Majesties expect to arrive next Saturday.

Hague, June 4, N. S. The States of Holland are still separated, and no Time is yet appointed for their next Assembly. The Prince of Orange returned Yesterday from Utrecht, and purposes to set out To-morrow or next Day for Breda. The Letters from Paris are arrived with the French King's Ordonnance, relating to the Suspension of Arms by Sea.

Hague, June 4, N. S. His Britannick Majesty arrived at Helvoetsluys on Sunday Morning, and set out from that Place about Six o'Clock, the same Morning for Utrecht, which Place his Majesty left that Afternoon before Three o'Clock, after having seen the Prince of Orange there. His Majesty had stop'd at Maeslandsluys to see the Princess Royal. His Majesty proposed to lie that Night at a Place some Leagues beyond Deventer, and on Monday at a Stage eight Leagues on the other Side of Os-

nabrug, so that it is thought the King will have reach'd Hanover early this Evening.

Rotterdam, June 4, N. S. By a Letter from Dunkirk of the 1st of June, the Cessation of Arms at Sea was published in that Port, and at Ostend the Day before.

S. by the Ministers of his Britannick Majesty, the most Christian King, and the States General of the United Provinces, to which Count Kaunitz the Imperial Minister had acceded the 25th of May, N. S.
