Hague, April 9. Yesterday in the evening arrived here, the Marqueis d'Affentar Maistre de Camp General of the Aims of the King of Spain, in the Spanish Nesher ands being sent by the Count de Monterey, to adjust the defigns of the approaching Campagne, the Succors, which in case of need, each party is to affift the other with, and the places for the Rendezvous of the two Armies, that of this State, and that of the spanish Netherlands : For it is resolved, That they shall act separately. We fancy here, That the Bishop of Munster will ere long find himfelf under a necessay of making Peace with us, for that we believe his affairs to be in a bad posture; that he cannot expect any considerable assistance from France; and lastly, that, as is said here, this State hath concluded an Alliance with the Princes of Erunswick and Lunenburgh. The reports here liave been very different concerning Wefel, being de-livered up to the Elector of Brandenburgh; for after formany that have been spread abroads there are some here in Town, who pretend to have advice, That the fourth instant the French Garison drew out from thence, and that, at the same time, Colonel Sibourg took possession of the place, in the name of the Elector of Colugner Our Letters from Groningen tell us, That Monfigur Rabenhaup had defeated a party of 1000 Munster Horse; that afterwards he was marched to Nien-bays, and had taken the place by storm. We are herevery ready to believe, that the French will quit all their Conquests in these Provinces, excepting only one or two places of the greatest importance; this is certain, That they empty their Magazines at Aernheim, and remove all their Ammunition, Provisions, &c. to Nimmegen. On Munday last the Mareschal Bestefonds arrived there.

Ditto, April 13. We formerly gave you an account, That it had been refolved by the States General to readmit the Province of Hirecht into the Union; but at the same time the Deputies of the Province of Fri f. find, declared. That they would not confent, unless Mireshe would for the future yield them the precedence: The matter has been hitherto controverted, Priestant prelling it very hard, and utrecht being as unwilling to part with their antient right, and great ries of Erie fland to quit their precention but in vain : Affembly of the States General, that they had received new and politive Orders from their Principals, to perfilt an might demand of the precedence; so that it is thought Midesbe will be forced to yield the Point, to prevent their utter ruine; that Province having suffered more

since the French quitted it, then they did before i having all this while been without any Government. The Marquels d'Affentar having demanded greater Succors to be sent to the Spanish Neitherlands, then we can spare them, nothing hath been agreed in the matter, but the Count de Walder is gone with him to Bruffels, to endeavor to adjust this affair with the Count de Monterey, All the Officers of the Army are commeanded to be ready against the first of May, the Ren-dezvous being appointed to be the fixth; in the mean time, there will be on the fifteenth instant; a General Review of the Forces of this State. We feeth here extreamly pleased with some Letters which are lately come from Berlin, which they say, give great affurances of the intention of the Elector of Brandenburgh to enter into the interests of this State, which, if true, there is little likelihood the French will quit Wefel to him: What has been faid of their leaving already abandoned it, proves a millake

Amsterdam April 12. Our Letters from Groningen of the eighth instant, tell us, That the Bishop of Muntfer having caused 1000 Horse to be brought together to oppose the farther progress of Monsieur Rabenhaup, they hapned to rencounter him near Northborne, and were defeated by him, and the Troops under his command: After which, Monsieur Rabenhaup marched towards Nienbuys, where, as is faid here, there were 1000 Men in Garison, and causing the place to be attacked, took it by storm. Exuffels, April 13. On Tuesday Viscount Berlin came hither from Valenciennes, and the next day was fent by his Excellency to Lieuwe to see in what condition that Garison is, both as to its Fortifications, and the number of Men it; and his Excellency has like-wise sent for the better security of that place sour Companies of the Count de Boumonts Regiment, so that there is now in it 1000 Foot, and 100 Horse. Ammunition and Carriages belonging to the Army, that were at Tillemont, are likewise conveyed to Lieuwe, for their better fecurity. They write likewife from Lieuwe, that a party sent out from thence, passing through the Suburbs of S. Truyen, in the Countrey of Liege, was shot at by the Garison there, and pursued almost to the Ports of Lieuwe, there being open hostilistic trustees of the country lity between those two places. The Viscount Berlin in his return from Lieune, has orders to go to Malines to see the Fortifications there; and so to return hither; but not as Governor, as was supposed. Monsieur Louvigny is declared Governor of this place, and the Prince of Aremburgh made Governor of Valenciennes, in the place of Viscount Berlin, whom his Excellency has appointed with Count de Rajeb, to be his two Lieute nant Generals in this Campagne. On Fuelday lands the Gates of Answerp were kept fluit till time in the morning, whilst the Margrave secured the Scotts, who is the next Officer to him; by order from his Excellency confined kim to his house with a Guardy seiled upon his fon, and carried him to she Town Prison. The Duke of Lorraine is now upon his march towards Burgundy with 8000 Men, 4000 of his own, and 4000 Germini, and will be there by the twenty fifth inflant; in the intarim, the Prince de Vaudemont is gotten into Befançon incognito, with a small Train, to encourage them rill the Dukes arrival: But our last news from thence, was very bad, telling us of the taking of Poligny and Arbis, and that they were in great tear of Salins, which was but two leagues from Arboic; and that the Smitfers had withdrawn their assistance, because his Excellency refused a Neutrality, which they had obtained of the French; and that they would not give passage to our Troops through their Territories for the fuccoring of Burgundy. It is faid the Countels de Monterey will go to Animery to stay there all this Campagne, for her greater fecurity. We are making great alterations in our Fortifications here, having at least 3000 Men daily at The Hollands Regiments deligned for our Garisons in Flanders, are not yet arrived; they are to be fix Regiments, of which, two are for Bruges, and the other four for Dam, Newpo t, Dixmude, and Tpre; and our Letters from Zealand fay, That three Regiments were arrived there in their way for Flanlers. It is faid, that 2000 Dutch Horfe and Dragoons are to be dis-imbarked at Bergen op Zoom, many Veffels being pressed for that purpose, which are to transport the rest of the Army by degrees, as they are ready.
