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Sleswick, May 30.

HIS Danish Majesty, after having passed through Zealand, Fuhnen, and Part of Jutland, reviewing his Troops in Garrison as he went along, arrived last Night at the Palace of Gottorff, where the Court will be very numerous To-day, several Princes, and almost all the Nobility of Sleswick and Holstein, being assembled here to wait upon his Majesty, who is in perfect Health, and has been every where received with the greatest Demonstrations of Joy and Affection by his Subjects.

Aix, June 2, N.S. M. St. Severin set out from hence Yesterday for Paris.

Niesseroy, June 7, N.S. Nothing new has happened here; it is said that the French are making Reforms in some of their Corps, and that they are getting into Cantonments.

Hague, June 7, N.S. The Prince of Orange's intended Journey to Breda has been postponed, on Account of the repeated Advices his Highness has received of the great Disturbances in the Provinces of Friesland; and it is now thought he will repair to Leeuwarden before he goes to the Army. The Violences committed by the Peasants in that Province has been very great. All the Houses belonging to the Farmers of the Revenue have been plundered, and laid level with the Ground; and several other Houses belonging to Gentlemen who were thought to be averse to any Alteration in the Government, have been reduced to Ashes. The States of the Province were to have a general and extraordinary Meeting as Yesterday, and we hear it was provisionally agreed to settle the Succession of the Stadtholdership in the Female Line of the Prince of Orange in Default of Heirs Male, and to invest the Stadtholder with the same Powers, Prerogatives and Privileges granted to him either by the Province of Holland, or by any of the other Provinces, as far as it could be consistent with the particular Form of their Government, the Decision and Determination of which they proposed should be to his Highness's Discretion.

Hague, June 8, N.S. A Courier is arrived from Leeuwarden, who brings an Account of Affairs having ended in that Province in the most amicable Manner. On Wednesday the States assembled, and as the Peasants insisted that the Deputies from the Villages should be allowed to go into the Town, in order to represent their Grievances to the States, the Gates were opened upon their promising that none should enter but the Deputies; when they were got in, they marched with great Silence and Decency to the Great Church, and there, with great Unanimity, agreed upon the Points which they were to insist upon, and then drew up a Petition, which was carried by a select Number of their Body to the States of the Province, who immediately granted their Request; the principal Article of which was, the Affairs of the Succession; the investing the

Stadtholder with the same Powers he has in the other Provinces; and the entire Abolition of Excises and Imposts of all Sorts. This satisfied the People, who immediately retired every Man to his Village without the least Disorder or Noise. It is said that they propose for the future to pay their Taxes by way of Capitation.
