*Sleswick, June 5.*

**T**HIS Morning about Ten o'Clock the King of Denmark set out for Rendsbourg, being to dine a little out of the Way thither at Koehoest, the Seat of Baron Dehn.

*Hamburg, June 8.* Great Preparations are making in this Neighbourhood for the Reception of his Danish Majesty, who is expected at Altona. Prince William of Saxe Gotha and his Princess are arrived here, and intend to pass some Months in Hamburg with the Dutchess of Holstein, Mother to the Princess.

*Dresden, June 9.* M. de la Sale, who made his Escape from the Fort of Munda, is retaken by the Vigilance of the Magistrates of Dantzick, and very closely confin'd.

*Hague, June 11.* In Consequence of the Declaration of the States of Friseland, a Deputation from them arrived here on Sunday, to intreat the Prince of Orange to honour them with his Presence as soon as possible, in order to settle the disordered Affairs of that Province; but as that Part of the Declaration relating to the new Powers to be granted to the Stadtholder was not so clearly expressed, one of the Deputies was sent back to Leewarden to have that Matter explain'd, and his Highness will not fix the Time of his Departure, till the Return of the said Deputy, who it is thought will bring a satisfactory Answer. The States General have actually made a Resolution, recalling all the Placarts prohibiting Commerce with France. An Advertisement was published four Days ago, by order of the College of the Admiralty residing at Amsterdam, whereby the Exportation of Corn to France and other Countries, is now to be allowed upon the same footing as it was before the Month of December last past. The States General have taken a Resolution to issue forthwith a Proclamation, in order to repeal all their Placarts published since the Beginning of last Summer, restraining the Trade with France; to recall their Privateers, and to prohibit the Continuation of Hostilities by Sea against the French King and his Subjects. M. Van Borselen, who was lately appointed by the States General to be their fifth Plenipotentiary at the Conferences at Aix la Chapelle, departed from hence three Days ago.

*Hague, June 14.* The Deputy from Friseland, who went back to Leewarden last Sunday, returned to this Place last Night, but the Prince of Orange's Departure for that Province is still undetermined, as his Highness has been of late a good deal out of Order with a violent Fit of the Cholick, attended with a Fever, for which he has been blooded and blistered, and is still confined to his Apartment, though his Highness this Day finds himself considerably better. The Quarter of Nimeguen has lately taken a Resolution to make the Prince of Orange's Present of the County of Culembourg, which they had purchased some Years ago for Twelve hundred thousand Florins of the Prince of Saxe Hildburghausen, Father to the Prince of that Name, who commands at present the Bavarian Troops in the Republick's Service: By the Improvements

which have been since made in that County, it is now valued at Two Millions of Florins. A Placart was published this Morning, proclaiming, till farther Orders, a Cessation of all Hostilities by Sea, and the Suspension of all the Placarts restraining and prohibiting the Trade with France. Lord Anson arrived here Yesterday in the Evening, and sets out again To-morrow Morning for Helvoetsluys. M. Hop, Envoy Extraordinary from the States General to the King of Great Britain, arrived here this Morning from England, in his Way to Hanover; to which Place, it is said, Mr. Charles Bentinck will likewise go immediately after his Return from Overyssele, where he went Yesterday Morning to take Possession of the Place of Droffart of Vollenhove, lately conferred upon him. This Employment deprives the Possessor of the Right of being deputed to the States General.

*Rotterdam, June 14.* A Placart, suspending the Execution of the three Placarts published last Year in Relation to the French Trade, was issued here last Wednesday; and it is expected, that a Proclamation was also issued out in France about ceasing of Hostilities at Sea against the Dutch.
