E have had an Account from Corsica, that Brigadier Cumiane, after battering the Town of Bastia for several Days with his small Train of Artillery to very little Purpose, had been oblig'd to raise the Siege and return to San Frorenzo.

Vienna, June 12, N.S. Their Imperial Majesties set out Yesterday for Moravia, and

will be absent for near a Fortnight.

Hague, June 21, N. S. The Progress the Mob have made here, has encouraged those of Leyden to rife again, where they have committed such Outrages, and are grown so strong, that it is apprehended the Magistrates will be obliged to suspend levying the Imposts. As an Instance that the better Sort of the Inhabitants here were not in the least concerned in the late Disorders, an Address is formed and intended to be presented to the Stadtholder, which, it is said, will be figned by 2000 of the principal Burghers, in which they declare their Abhorrence of what is palled, and that they are ready, under the Authority of the States and the Prince of Orange, to repel Force by Force, in order to defend the publick Peace and Tranquility against all such lawless Attempts of the Mob.

Hague, June 25, N. S. The Prince of Orange being recovered of his Fever, removed last Saturday to the House in the Wood for the Benefit of the Air. Count Bentinck and M. de Catwyck arrived here last Saturday from Aix la Chapelle. By the last Letters received this Morning from Amsterdam, we are informed that every Thing was Yesterday there in the utmost Confusion on Account of the Pachters.

Dublin, June 11.

This Day being the Anniversary of his Majesty's happy Accession to the Throne, the great Guns were fired in the Phœnix Park, and answered by Vollies from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out on Oxmantown Green. At Noon their Excellencies the Lords Justices met at the Castle, and received the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction; and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.
