Aix la Chapelle, June 26, N. S.

Soto Mayor, the Spanish Minister, having received Orders from his Court, as has likewife the Marquis Doria, the Genoese Minister, to accede, purely and fimply, to the Preliminaries for a General Pacification, it was agreed by the Plenipotentiaries, that their feveral Acts of Accellion, for the Conclusion of that important Affair, should be figned To-morrow or next Day. Liege, June 25, N.S. The 27th Instant Count Chanclos is to begin his March from Ruremond, with eight Auftrian Regiments of Infantry and four of Cavalry, towards the Dutchy of Luxembourg, where they will be encamped for the Conveniency of Forage. Hague, June 28, N. S. As every Thing feem'd to be very quiet at Amsterdam, and the rest of the Towns of this Province, notwithstanding the great Diforders committed by the Mob at Harlem, Leyden, and this Place, People began to hope that the last Placart of the States had produced this good Effect; when, on a fudden, we were informed laft Tuesday by an Express from Amsterdam, that the Riot had begun there the Evening before, with fo much Violence, that upwards of Twenty Pachters Houses had been demolished, and that the Mob had carried their Infolence fo far, as even to pull down one of those Houses, opposite to the Stadt-House, and under the very Eyes of their Magistrates, who were then extraordinarily affembled upon the Occasion: As the whole Garrison of Amsterdam confists of no more than four Companies of Militia, there was no other Method left for the Magistrates to quell the Commotion, but to have recourse to the Burghers, though what had happehed at the Hague, Hatlem and Leyden, gave them no room to expect much better Success from their Affistance; however they were affembled, and Orders given to fire upon the Rioters, if they could not be dispersed otherwise. They were soon obliged to come to this last Extremity, in Consequence of which, about a Dozen People were killed upon the Spot, to the great Concern of all the Burghers, who are univerfally as much incensed against the Pachters as the loweft of the Mob. As foon as the Prince of Orange was informed of what

was doing at Amsterdam, he resolved to go directly to the Assembly of the States of Holland, where he made a Proposal for abolishing the Pachters, in order to appeale the general Cry of the People, defiring them to find out fome other Method of raifing the necessary Funds for the Support of the State. The Diminution this Abolition of the Taxes will occasion in the Revenues of this Province, will amount to near tan Millions of Florins a Year. The People at Utrecht having also began to shew some Uneasinefs, the Magistrates immediately refolved to grant them the Abolition of the Taxes upon feveral of the Necessaries of Life, before any Mifchief was done. General La Roque's Sentence was pronounced to him the Day before Yefterday at the Head of the Troops encamped near Breda, but was mitigated as far as concern'd his Life, he having only had the Sword paffed over his Head, and being condemned to perpetual Imprisonment in the Castle of Loevestein. Hague, June 29, N.S. This Day his Grace the Duke of Newcastle, his Britannick Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, sets out from this Place for the Army; from whence his Grace is to proceed to Hanover.
