*Berlin, June 25.* The King of Prussia went this Morning from Potsdam to Magdebourg, in order to review his Troops quartered in that Part of his Dominions, and will return to Potsdam next Sunday.

*Aix, June 28, N. S.* The Acts of Accession of his Catholick Majesty and the Republick of Genoa to the Preliminaries for a general Pacification, were signed here this Day by their respective Ministers.

*Hague, July 2, N. S.* The publick Tranquility seems to be quite restored in this Province, since the Resolution taken by the States of Holland to abolish directly all the Taxes farmed out to the Pächters; but the Government has however thought it necessary to make some Examples of the Ringleaders amongst the Rioters; accordingly on Friday last, a Man and Woman, who were at the Head of them at Amsterdam, were hanged there, but during the Time of Execution the Populace assembled in a tumultuous Manner, and made some Motions as if they intended to rescue the Criminals, and having attempted to force some of the Avenues where the Burghers were posted, they thereupon fired upon the Mob, by which between 20 and 30 were killed and wounded, and the Confusion occasioned thereby was so great, that a considerable Number of the Spectators were pushed into the Canals, and several Persons drowned, besides some others crushed and trampled to Death. Yesterday another of the Ringleaders of the late Disorders was hanged at this Place, according to his Sentence, which was executed without the least Disturbance. The Inveteracy of the Populace against the Pächters begins likewise to appear in the Province of Utrecht, notwithstanding the Resolution that was lately taken there to suppress the Imposts upon the several Necessaries of Life. At Amersford the Magistrates have been obliged to abolish all the Taxes, to prevent the Mischief that was threatened.
