Constantinople, May 25. There are fresh Letters arrived from Erzerum to the Merchants of the Country, which say, that the new Shah of Persia maintains his Government with the general Approbation of the People; that the several Pretenders are reduced, or dispersed; and that he has invited the Merchants of Erzerum to come and traffick in his Kingdom as before, promising them the utmost Security and Encouragement; and they are preparing to set out.

Hanover, June 21, O. S. Prince William of Hesse arrived here on Sunday Night last to wait on his Majesty, and proposes to stay some Days.

Head Quarters at Nistleroy, July 5. His Grace the Duke of Newcastle set out Yesterday in the Afternoon for Hanover, and Count Bentinck at the same Time for the Hague. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland is constantly employed in reviewing the Troops which are going into the Places of their Cantonment.

Hague, July 5, N. S. Besides the timely Precaution of the Magistrates of Utrecht to suppress the Taxes upon several Necessaries of Life, a Deputation from the States of that Province was sent to this Place to consult with the Prince of Orange about the Measures proper to be taken in the present Situation of their Affairs: But the Impatience of the Mob to get rid of the Pacters, was not to be contain'd, for the Day before Yesterday they assembled in a tumultuous Manner, and, like the Rioters in this Province, they attacked and destroyed several of their Houses. The Regiment of Horse of Canenbourg, that happens at present to be there, was immediately order'd to disperse them; but tho' three or four Persons were killed upon this Occasion, the Tumult could not be appeas'd till the States had publickly declared their Resolution to suppress directly all the Pacters, and to abolish the Taxes farm'd out to them. There begins to be some Ferment in Guelderland, where the Mob have even had the Insolence to set Fire to the Stadt-house of Hattem, but however without doing any considerable Damage, as it was extinguish'd in Time. Lieutenant General Grovestins was dispatched last Wednesday by the Prince of Orange into Friesland, where the Confusion grows daily greater. The Chevalier d'Ossorio arrived here from England on Wednesday, and Count Czernichew Yesterday, and they both intend to set out for Hanover the Day after Tomorrow.
