Hambourg, July 31, N. S.

THE second Ship which the Danes expected this Year from China; is arrived and richly laden. The King of Denmark has conferr'd the Post of Commandant of the Fortress of Friderickstadt in Norway, vacant by the Death of Lieutenant General Huitfeldt, upon Major General Sturm, who had the Command of a Regiment of national Troops in Jutland. The Queen of Denmark has appeared again in Publick, and is perfectly recovered from her late Indisposition, and proceeding happily in her Pregnancy.

Liege, August 2, N. S. Marshal Lowendahl quits Maestricht next Monday and goes to Brussels, from thence to Namur with the Marshal General, who designs to visit that Fortification, after which M. de Lowendahl sets out for Paris. The French Hussars have received Orders to be in Readiness to march next Week towards the French Frontiers.

Head Quarters at Eyndhoven, Aug. 6, N. S. To-morrow his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland sets out for Hanover, and during his Absence the Army will be under the Command of General Sir John Ligonier.

Hague, August 6, N. S. Some Disturbances having lately happened at a Place called Muiden, in the Neighbourhood of Amsterdam, on Account of the Duties which are usually paid there by the Skippers for the opening of the Sluices, a Detachment of the Foot Guards was sent thither last Sunday Morning, in order to protect and support the Collectors of those Duties. M. Van Borselen arrived here the Day before Yesterday from Aix la Chapelle, from which Place Count Bentinck is likewise expected To-morrow. We are just informed that an Express is arrived from Leuwarden, with the News that every Thing relating to the Prince of Orange, as Stadtholder of Friesland, has been settled entirely to his Highness's Satisfaction.

Hague, August 9, N. S. M. Butler, who was lately the States General's Consul at Gibraltar, has been appointed to repair to Morocco, in order to renew the Treaty of Peace with the

Emperor of that Country. Count Bentinck is not yet arrived from Aix la Chapelle, but is hourly expected.
